I. NOTES ON THE LITURGY.

I. THE FESTIVALS.

The Festivals of the Church are not all celebrated with the same degree of solemnity; the words *Double*, *Semi-Double*, and *Simple*, found in the Calendar, show the degree of solemnity with which each feast is celebrated. The order is as follows: *double of the first class*, *double of the second class*, *double major*, *double*, *semi-double*, and *simple*. When the office is *double*, an entire Anthem is said or sung before and after each Psalm; when *semi-double*, only a word or two are said or sung before the Psalm. A *simple* has only three lessons at Matins. A *feria* is a week-day for which no Saint's Office is appointed.

The principal Festivals are *doubles of the first class*. Some Festivals have an Octave, or succession of eight days, on which, with certain exceptions, the Office and Mass of the Feast are said, or a commemoration made.

II. THE ROMAN MISSAL AND VESPER BOOK.

The prayers, and portions of the Holy Scripture, of which the Mass is composed, are partly always the same and partly different every day. Those that are invariable are contained in what is called the *Ordinary* of the Mass, at the beginning of the Missal. The parts that are changeable, or *proper*—*viz.*, the *Introits*, *Collects*, *Graduals* and *Tracts*, *Gospels*, *Offertories*, *Secrets*, *Communions*, and *Post-Communions*—form the subsequent contents. As the *Prefaces* are not so frequently subject to change, they follow each other in regular succession in the *Ordinary* of the Mass.

If a double of the 1st or 2nd class, or a Feast of the Lord, falls on a Sunday, the Mass of the Feast is said instead of that of the Sunday, unless it be a Sunday of the *first class*—*viz.*, the First Sunday of Advent, the Sundays of Lent, Passion, Palm, Easter, Low, Pentecost, and Trinity Sundays—which are never superseded. The Sundays of the *second class*, which are superseded only by doubles of the *first class*, are the 2nd, 3rd, and 4th of Advent; Septuagesima, Sexagesima, and Quinquagesima Sundays. The Gospels for Sundays thus superseded are said at the end of the Mass, instead of St John's Gospel; and a Commemoration of Sunday, by its proper *Collect*, *Secret*, and *Post-Communion*, is made after the Collect, etc., of the Festival. The Calendar, in the first part of this Directory, indicates the various Prayers said at Mass on each day of the year.

The Evening Service of the Church is contained in the Vesper Book. The following is the order of Vespers: *Pater noster* and *Ave Maria* being said, the Priest intones the Versicle *Deus, in adiutorium meum intende*, to which the choir answer by the Response, *Domine, ad adjuvandum me festina*, with the *Gloria Patri*; and when five Psalms, with their Anthems, have been sung, the Priest chants the *Little Chapter*. Then are sung the Hymn, with its Versicle and Response, and *Magnificat* with its

Anthem, followed by the Prayers and Commemorations appointed for the day ; which, if it be neither a double nor within an Octave, are followed by the Commemoration or *Suffrage* of the Saints (or during Paschal time, the Commemoration of the Cross), to be found after the Common Vespers for Sunday. All these Commemorations on Sunday are indicated in the Calendar.

II. THE ANGELUS.

In Catholic countries, and in many places at home, the Angelus Bell is rung in the morning, at noon, and in the evening at sunset to honour the Mystery of the Incarnation. To gain the indulgences attached to this Devotion, the Angelus must be said *kneeling*, except on Saturday evening and Sunday, when it is said *standing*. In Paschal Time, that is, from Holy Saturday at noon till the Saturday before Trinity Sunday at noon, inclusively, the *Regina Cœli* is said instead of the Angelus. This prayer is always said *standing*. Those who do not know the *Regina Cœli* may gain the indulgences by saying the Angelus ; but it must be said *standing* during Paschal Time. For the convenience of the Faithful is appended a translation of the *Regina Cœli* taken from the *Raccolta*.

Queen of Heaven, rejoice. Alleluia.

For He whom thou wast made worthy to bear. Alleluia.

Hath arisen as He said. Alleluia.

Pray for us to our God. Alleluia.

V. Rejoice and be glad, O Virgin Mary. Alleluia.

R. For the Lord hath risen indeed. Alleluia.

Let us pray.

O God, who through the resurrection of Thy Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, has vouchsafed to give joy to the whole world, grant us, we beseech Thee, that through the intercession of the Virgin Mary, His Mother, we may obtain the joys of eternal life. Through the same Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

III. INDULGENCES GRANTED TO THE FAITHFUL IN SCOTLAND.

An Indulgence is a remission of the whole, or a part, of the *temporal* punishment that often remains to be suffered for sins which, as to their guilt and *eternal* punishment, have been already remitted. For the effect and validity of an Indulgence, it is not only necessary that there be a competent authority in him who grants it, and a just cause or motive for the grant, but it is also necessary, on the part of him who obtains it, that he renounce and be sincerely sorry for all his sins, that he be in the state of grace, and that he duly perform the conditions prescribed. Of Indulgences, some are called *plenary*, which, when fully obtained, remit the whole of the temporal punishment that remained due on account of past sins ; others are for a certain number of years or days, which, when fully obtained, remit as much of the temporal punishment as would have been discharged by the performance of so many years or days of Canonical Penance.

The conditions for most of the Plenary Indulgences include confession. But for those who go to confession once a week, their weekly confession, if they remain in a state of grace, will suffice (Decrees of 9th Sept. 1763, and 15th Nov. 1841); and, by a Decree of 12th June 1822, a Plenary Indulgence granted for a *festival* may be gained if the confession be made a week before. Moreover, by a Decree of 6th Oct. 1870, it will for *any* Indulgence suffice that the confession, and also the Holy Communion, be made on the day before that which is appointed for the Indulgence.

The Holy See has been graciously pleased to grant to the Faithful in Scotland the following Plenary Indulgences, on certain conditions after specified:—

1st, From the Feast of St Thomas, Apostle, 21st December, to the first Sunday after the Epiphany, inclusively.

2nd, From Ash-Wednesday to the second Sunday of Lent, inclusively.

3rd, During the time appointed in each Diocese for complying with Easter duties.

4th, From Pentecost Sunday to Sunday after Corpus Christi.

5th, From Sunday before the Feast of SS. Peter and Paul to the Octave day.

6th, From Sunday before the Feast of the Assumption to the Octave day.

7th, From Sunday before the Feast of All Saints to the Octave day.

8th, On the Feast of St Andrew, and during the Octave.

The following are the CONDITIONS on which the Faithful may gain these Indulgences.

1st, That within the time prescribed they approach to the Sacraments of Penance and the Holy Eucharist.

2nd, That on the day of their Communion they offer up some prayers to God for the happy state of the whole Church of Christ, for its Supreme Pastor, the Bishop of Rome; for peace and concord between all Christian Princes; for the exaltation and propagation of the Holy Catholic Faith, especially in our own country; and for the eternal salvation of all Christians.

3rd, That, if they have an opportunity, they visit within the limited time some church or oratory, and pray to God as has been mentioned before.

4th, That, if their circumstances enable them, they perform some works of mercy.

IV. INDULGENCE FOR THE LITANY OF THE B. VIRGIN.

On the 6th May 1879, His Holiness granted the Apostolic Benediction, and an Indulgence of seven years on each Saturday, and on the Feasts of the Blessed Virgin, to the Faithful of England and Scotland who shall recite or sing the Litany of the Blessed Virgin in any church in either country.

V. THE PENTECOST NOVENA.

For the Pentecost Novena, prescribed by Encyclical Letters of 5th May 1895, and 9th May 1897, the following Indulgences have been granted to those taking part in the Novena; 1st, seven years and seven quarantines for each day; 2nd, a Plenary Indulgence on any one day of Novena, or on Pentecost, or on any day of the subsequent Octave, on the usual conditions of Confession and Communion and prayers for the Pope's intention. [These Indulgences are attainable by those also who are legitimately impeded from attending the Public Devotions, provided the Novena be done in private and the other conditions fulfilled.] Moreover, those who again, during the Octave of Pentecost, inclusive of Trinity Sunday, publicly or privately recite every day, according to their devotion, some prayers to the Holy Ghost, and satisfy the other conditions, may gain a second time the above Indulgences, both plenary and partial. All these Indulgences are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

N.B.—By a *quarantine* Indulgence is meant the remission of so much of the future penalty (*poena*) of sin as is the equivalent of keeping a Lent according to the strict discipline of the Church. (*Raccolta*).

VI. DEVOTIONS IN THE OCTAVE OF CORPUS CHRISTI.

For the continuance and daily increase of the abundant fruit produced by the Decree of 20th December 1905, on *Daily Communion*, Our Holy Father, POPE PIUS X., by a letter of the Sacred Congregation of Indulgences of the 10th April 1907, to the Bishops of the Catholic Church, has expressed his wish to have, as far as may be possible, the following annual observances:—

(a) IN CATHEDRAL CHURCHES.

That on Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, either immediately after the Festival of CORPUS CHRISTI, or (if the circumstances of persons or places so require) at some other time of the year to be fixed by the Bishop, there shall be in every Cathedral Church three days' prayer, as here described: namely—

I.—That, *on each day*, there shall be a sermon on the great excellence of the Sacrament of the Eucharist, and on the dispositions required for worthily receiving it. That, after the sermon, the Blessed Sacrament shall be exposed; and during the Exposition the prayer *O most Sweet Jesus* (see below) shall be recited, to be followed on the Sunday by the *Te Deum*. That the *Tantum ergo* shall then be sung, and the Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament be given.

II.—That, *on the Sunday*, the last of the three days, there shall be, at the usual parochial Mass, a homily by the Parish Priest on the gospel of the Sunday within the octave of CORPUS

CHRISTI—or, if the Sunday be not within the Octave, a sermon in preparation for a fervent Communion; and at this parochial Mass the faithful shall communicate. That, on this Sunday afternoon (or evening), there shall be the same service as on the two preceding days. And in the sermon the preacher shall exhort the faithful to more fervent piety towards the Most Holy Sacrament, and especially to a more frequent participation of this heavenly banquet, in accordance with the approved teaching of the *Catechismus Romanus* (see n. vi. of the Decree of 20th December 1905). Moreover, at Benediction (as is said above), the *Tantum ergo* will be preceded by the *Te Deum*.

(b) IN PARISH CHURCHES.

His Holiness earnestly recommends that also in Parish Churches according as each Bishop in his prudence and discernment shall judge fit, there shall be at least those pious exercises which are above described for the cathedral Churches for the Sunday within the octave, or some other Sunday in the year.

That the faithful may more eagerly take part in the aforesaid pious exercises, His Holiness has been pleased to grant the following Indulgences, applicable also to the Souls in Purgatory:—

1. An Indulgence of seven years and seven quarantines for each of the three days' prayer. 2. A Plenary Indulgence to be gained once during the three days, on any day thereof, by those who devoutly assist at the devotions of any one day, and after Confession and Holy Communion pray for the intentions of the Holy Father. 3. A Plenary Indulgence to be gained on the Sunday by all who, after Confession, receive Holy Communion together in a Cathedral or a Parish Church, and pray for the Holy Father's intentions.

PRAYER BEFORE THE BLESSED SACRAMENT.

O most sweet Jesus, Who didst come into this world to enrich the souls of all mankind with the life of Thy grace, and Who, to preserve and sustain this life in them, dost daily give Thyself in the most august Sacrament of the Eucharist, as a saving medicine to heal their infirmities and a divine food to support their weakness, we pray and beseech Thee to pour forth upon them most graciously Thy holy spirit, so that, being filled there, with, any who are in mortal sin may, by returning to Thee, be restored to the life of grace which they have lost; and that those who, by Thy great mercy, already serve Thee may daily, as far as each one is able, come devoutly to Thy heavenly banquet, and in the strength thereof may find a remedy for their daily venial faults and a support of the life of Thy grace, and, thus becoming more and more cleansed from sin, may obtain the everlasting happiness of heaven. Amen.

VII. DEVOTIONS ON THE FEAST OF THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS.

By a Decree of the S. Congregation of Indulgences, 22nd August 1906, His Holiness Pope Pius X. ordered that each year, on the Feast of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, in all Parish Churches as well as others where the feast is observed, the form of Consecration issued by Pope Leo XIII. on the 25th May 1899 should be recited during exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, followed by the Litany of the Sacred Heart. To all who with devout and contrite heart assist at this pious exercise and pray for the Pope's intentions, His Holiness grants an Indulgence of seven years and seven quarantines, and further a Plenary Indulgence to those who after confession receive Holy Communion. These Indulgences are applicable to the souls in Purgatory.

VIII. THE DEVOTIONS FOR THE MONTH OF OCTOBER.

For the *October Devotions*, prescribed by Decrees of 20th August 1885, etc., the following Indulgences have been granted: *1st*, seven years and seven quarantines each time one joins in the public recital of the Rosary and Litany of the B. Virgin (or, being legitimately impeded, says them privately), and prays according to the intentions of the Pope; *2nd*, a Plenary Indulgence to those who, having done this at least ten times, confess and communicate; *3rd*, a Plenary Indulgence to all who, on the Feast of the Rosary or within the Octave, confess, communicate, and pray in some church to God and the B. Virgin according to the intention of his Holiness; *4th*, seven years and seven quarantines, each time, for the recital of the following prayer to St Joseph enjoined by the Encyclical of 15th August 1889.

PRAYER TO S. JOSEPH.

To thee, O blessed Joseph, we fly in our tribulation, and while imploring the help of thy most holy spouse, thy protection also with confidence we crave. By that affection which united thee with the Immaculate Virgin, Mother of God, and by the fatherly love with which thou didst embrace the Child Jesus, we humbly supplicate thee to look down benignantly on the heritage which Christ Jesus purchased with His Blood, and in thy might and power to succour us in our necessities.

Defend, O most provident Guardian of the Divine Family, the chosen race of Jesus Christ; keep us, most loving father, from all taint of error and corruption; do thou from heaven, as our most powerful Protector, stand graciously by us in this conflict with the powers of darkness; and as of old thou didst rescue the Child Jesus in the imminent peril of His life, so now defend the Holy Church of God from hostile wiles and all adversity, and through thy never-failing patronage so shield each one of us, that, guided by thy example and supported by thy aid, we may live in holiness, piously die, and attain eternal happiness in heaven. Amen.

IX. PRAYERS ENJOINED BY THE POPE.

To be said kneeling after Low Mass.

Hail Mary, *three times.* Then *Salve Regina.*

Hail, Holy Queen, Mother of Mercy; Hail, our life, our sweetness and our hope. To Thee do we cry, poor banished children of Eve; to Thee do we send up our sighs, mourning and weeping in this vale of tears. Turn then, most gracious Advocate, Thine eyes of mercy towards us; and after this our exile, show unto us the Blessed Fruit of Thy womb, Jesus; O clement, O loving, O sweet Virgin Mary.

V. Pray for us, O Holy Mother of God.

R. That we may be made worthy of the promises of Christ.

Let us pray.

O God, our refuge and our strength, look with favour on Thy people who cry to Thee; and through the intercession of the Glorious and Immaculate Virgin Mary, Mother of God, and Blessed Joseph her Spouse, of Thy Blessed Apostles Peter and Paul, and of all the Saints, mercifully and graciously hear the prayers which we pour forth for the conversion of sinners, and for the freedom and exaltation of our Holy Mother the Church. Through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

St Michael the Archangel defend us in the day of battle; be our safeguard against the wickedness and snares of the devil;—"the Lord command him," we humbly pray;—and do thou, O Prince of the Heavenly Host, by the power of God, thrust into hell Satan and the other wicked spirits who go about the world for the destruction of souls. Amen. (*300 days Indulgence*).

To the above prayers may be added the following invocation said three times:

Most Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us.

(Indulgence of 7 years and 7 quarantines).

X. ASSOCIATION FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE FAITH.

This Institution assists by prayers and alms the Missionaries who are engaged in preaching the Gospel. The prayers are a *Pater* and *Ave* each day. It will suffice to say for this purpose the *Pater* and *Ave* of our morning and night prayers, adding the aspiration, *Saint Francis Xavier, pray for us.* The alms is only one half-penny per week. One member in ten acts as collector, and pays in the amount to another member, who has ten such collections to receive. Donations are likewise thankfully received. Two com-

mittees, one in Paris, and the other at Lyons, distribute their alms to the Missions. A return of the sums received, and of their appropriation, is inserted annually in the *Annals of the Propagation of the Faith*. This collection, to the reading of which each member is entitled, appears six times a year. One copy is supplied to every ten members.

PLENARY INDULGENCES.—On the 3rd of May (the Anniversary of the foundation of the Society); the 3rd of December (the feast of S. Francis Xavier); the feasts of the Epiphany, Annunciation, and Assumption—or any day within the Octave of these five festivals; the 29th of September (the feast of S. Michael); all the feasts of the Apostles; two days in each month, at the member's option; once a year for the *general* commemoration of deceased members; once a year for the *special* commemoration of deceased members of the Council, Committee, or Decade to which he belongs; at the hour of death, provided he invokes the name of Jesus. Children, who have not yet made their first communion, may likewise gain these indulgences. These and the following are applicable to the souls in Purgatory:—

PARTIAL INDULGENCES.—300 days every time a member attends the Triduum of the 3rd of May and the 3rd of December; 100 days every time a member recites *Our Father* and *Hail Mary*, together with the invocation of S. Francis Xavier; seven years and seven quarantines every time a member performs any good work in the interests of the Society.

FAVOUR OF PRIVILEGED ALTARS.—For every Mass said in the name of a member for a deceased member. For personal privileges and other special favours to Priests, see the *Annals*.

Whoever contributes at one time 200 francs (£8), at the least, to establish a permanent fund—even though this sum should be immediately expended on the Missions—shall be regarded as a member in perpetuity, and as such enjoy all the privileges and indulgences on performing the other conditions prescribed.

Alms and Donations for the Association are received in Scotland by any of the Clergy.

XI. EASTER DUTIES AND INDULGENCE.

By a Rescript from the Holy See, dated 12th August 1911, the Faithful of the Dioceses of S. Andrews and Edinburgh, Glasgow and Dunkeld, are authorised to satisfy the obligation of the Paschal Communion, and to gain the Plenary Indulgence, on any day from the first Sunday of Lent to Sunday within the Octave of the Ascension, inclusively; and those of the Diocese of Galloway, of Aberdeen, and of Argyll and the Isles, from the first Sunday of Lent till Low Sunday. This extension is granted for a term of five years.

XII. FAST AND ABSTINENCE DAYS, AND LENTEN INDULT.

I. FAST DAYS ON ONE MEAL.

1st, All the days in Lent except Sundays.

2nd, The Wednesdays and Fridays of Advent; but when St Andrew's falls on a Wednesday it is not a Fast-Day.

3rd, The Ember-days occurring in the four seasons of the year, being the Wednesdays, Fridays, and Saturdays after the first Sunday of Lent, after Pentecost Sunday, after the third Sunday of September, and after the third Sunday of Advent. But if the 14th of September, or the 13th of December, fall upon a Wednesday, the Ember-Days of that season are kept the week following.

4th, The Vigils or Eves of Pentecost Sunday, of SS. Peter and Paul, of the Assumption, of All Saints, of S. Andrew, and of Christmas.

N.B.—When a Fast-Day falls upon a Sunday, it is to be observed on the Saturday before.

II. DAYS OF ABSTINENCE.

On which the Church prohibits the use of Flesh Meat.

1st, All Fast-Days, unless a Dispensation be granted for some days in Lent. Outside of Lent, if a Fast-Day (such as a Vigil or an Ember-Saturday) immediately precedes or follows a Friday or other day of abstinence, flesh meat may be taken on such Fast Day.

2nd, All the Sundays in Lent, unless a Dispensation be granted.

3rd, The Fridays throughout the year. But if a Holiday of obligation falls on a Friday, it is not a day either of fasting or of abstinence.

III. LENTEN REGULATIONS FOR 1915.

By authority of the Holy See.

1. *For those who are bound to fast.*

1. Flesh meat is allowed at the chief meal on all days, except Wednesdays and Fridays, Ember Saturday, and Holy Saturday.

2. Eggs, milk, butter, butterine or margarine, and cheese, are allowed every day without exception, both at the chief meal and, in small quantity, at collation. [Butterine is now allowed throughout the year.]

3. Dripping and lard are allowed at the chief meal and, in small quantity, at the collation every day in Lent except Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. [This permission is now extended to all fast and abstinence days throughout the year.]

4. Suet is allowed only when flesh meat is allowed.

2. *For those who are not bound to fast.*

The kinds of food which are allowed at their principal meal to those who are bound to fast, are allowed at all times to those who are not so bound, with the exception of Holy Thursday, on which day flesh meat may be taken only at one meal.

3. *For all.*

1. On Sundays flesh meat, eggs, etc., may be taken by fasters and non-fasters alike at every meal; but fish and flesh cannot be taken at the same meal.

2. The prohibition of fish and flesh at the same meal applies to all days in Lent, as also to all fast-days throughout the year, and is binding on both fasters and non-fasters.

N.B.—The Holy Father earnestly exhorts the Faithful to compensate for these relaxations, granted for very urgent reasons, by other good works, and especially by almsgiving to the poor.

XIII. MARRIAGES.

By the decree of the Council of Trent (Sess. 24, Chap. 10 de Reformat. Matrimonii), the solemnising of Marriage is forbidden from Ash Wednesday till Low Sunday, inclusively, and from the first Sunday of Advent till the Feast of the Epiphany, inclusively.

The decree of the same Council (*ibid.* Chap. 1) respecting Clandestine Marriages was extended to the whole of Ireland on the 2nd December 1827, and was consequently in force thirty days afterwards.

A decree, issued with orders and sanction of the Holy Father by the Sacred Congregation of the Council on the 2nd August 1907, introduced into the marriage laws new and important legislation which, while binding the Church at large from Easter Sunday of 1908, by a special exemption of the Holy See (S. Cong. de Prop. Fide, 29th February 1908), came into force in Scotland on and after the 1st September of the same year. By this decree it is enacted, among other things, that no Catholic (with certain stated exceptions) can validly contract marriage save before the parish priest or the Ordinary (or the delegate of either), and at least two witnesses. (*See extracts below.*)

Marriage cannot be contracted by persons within the 4th degree of kindred without a Dispensation; and, if attempted, is invalid.—Spiritual kindred, contracted by Baptism or Confirmation, is an impediment.

A "mixed marriage" (that is, a marriage between a Catholic and one who, though baptised, does not profess the Catholic Faith) is unlawful without a Dispensation; and the Dispensation cannot lawfully be given unless for a sufficiently grave reason, and subject to the following conditions: 1. That *all* the children that may be born of the marriage shall be baptised, and brought up, in the Catholic Faith. 2. That the Catholic party shall have full liberty for the practice of the Catholic religion. 3. That no religious marriage ceremony shall take place elsewhere than before the Catholic Priest. 4. That the Catholic party shall endeavour to effect the conversion of the non-Catholic party to the true faith of Christ.

*Extract from Decree Ne Temere on Engagements and Marriages,
2nd August 1907.*

I. Only those engagements are considered valid and produce canonical effects which have been contracted in writing signed by both the parties and by either the parish priest or the Ordinary of the place, or at least by two witnesses.

II. Only those marriages are valid which are contracted before the parish priest or the Ordinary of the place or a priest delegated by either of these, and at least two witnesses.

III. The parish priest and the Ordinary of the place validly assist at a marriage :

(a) only within the limits of their territory : within which they assist validly at marriages not only of their own subjects, but also of those not subject to them ;

(b) provided when invited and asked, and not compelled by violence or by grave fear, they demand and receive the consent of the contracting parties.

IV. They assist licitly :

(a) when they have legitimately ascertained the free state of the contracting parties ;

(b) when they have ascertained that one of the contracting parties has a domicile, or at least has lived for a month in the place where the marriage takes place ;

V. When danger of death is imminent and where the parish priest or the Ordinary of the place or a priest delegated by either of these cannot be had, in order to provide for the relief of conscience and (should the case require it) for the legitimation of offspring, marriage may be contracted validly and licitly before any priest and two witnesses.

VI. Should it happen that in any district the parish priest or the Ordinary of the place or a priest delegated by either of them, before whom marriage can be celebrated, is not to be had, and that this condition of things has lasted for a month, marriage may be validly and licitly entered upon by the formal declaration of consent made by the spouses in the presence of two witnesses.

VII. (a) The above laws are binding on all persons baptised in the Catholic Church and on those who have been converted to it from heresy or schism.

(b) The same laws are binding also on the same Catholics as above, if they contract engagements or marriage with non-Catholics, baptised, or unbaptised, even after a dispensation has been obtained.

(c) Non-Catholics, whether baptised or unbaptised, who contract among themselves, are nowhere bound to observe the Catholic form of engagements or marriage.

XIV. SICK CALLS.

All sick calls should be given in at the Priest's house at a timely hour in the morning. If this reasonable rule were adhered to, it would save the Clergy much unnecessary labour, and the people many disappointments, which they may justly ascribe to their own want of system.

On Saturdays, eves of Holidays, and other days which are generally devoted to the Confessional, the Priest should not, if possible, be called away from this important duty. Unless in cases of necessity, sick calls should not be made on Saturdays or Sundays, when the Clergy have so many other duties to attend to.

It is the duty of the people to conform to whatever regulations may be made by the Clergy, on these and other matters connected with Religion, in their respective congregations. All things should be done in order, according to the advice of St Paul.

When the Priest is called to attend a sick person, everything that he requires for the administration of the Sacraments should be furnished as decently as possible in the room where the sick person lies—viz., a table covered with a clean linen cloth, on which should be laid a candle, a vessel of holy water with an Asperges, a small vessel of common water for the purification of the Priest's fingers after the administration of the Holy Viaticum, and a napkin for the sick person at the time of Communion. As the Priest generally brings the Blessed Sacrament on these occasions, everything should be so becomingly prepared, according to their means, as to show the great respect of the inmates for Jesus Christ, and the high value they set upon the honour thus rendered to their house in the visit of their Lord and Redeemer.

While the Priest is administering the Viaticum and Extreme Unction, the assistants should devoutly offer up their prayers to God on behalf of the sick person, to implore that he may receive those Sacraments with the necessary dispositions.

XV. ECCLESIASTICAL TITLES AND MODES OF ADDRESS.

CARDINALS.—*His Eminence Cardinal* [name]; if a Bishop or Archbishop: *His Eminence Cardinal Archbishop* (or *Bishop*) of . . . ; or *His Eminence Cardinal* [name], *Archbishop of* . . . ; *My Lord Cardinal*; *Your Eminence*.

ARCHBISHOPS.—*His Grace the Archbishop of* . . . ; or *The Most Rev.* [name], *Archbishop of* . . . ; *My Lord Archbishop*; *Your Grace*.

BISHOPS.—*His Lordship the Bishop of* . . . ; or *The Right Rev.* [name], *Bishop of* . . . ; *My Lord Bishop*; *Your Lordship*. (In Ireland Bishops are usually addressed as *Most Rev.*)

VICARS-GENERAL. — These hold the rank of Protonotaries Apostolic, and are addressed: *The Right Rev. Mgr.* [name], *V.G.*; if also Provost or Canon: *The Right Rev. Mgr. Provost* or *Canon* [name], *V.G.*

PROVOSTS, CANONS.—*The Very Rev. Provost* or *Canon* [name]; or *The Very Rev. A. Canon* B.

DOMESTIC PRELATES, Privy Chamberlains and Honorary Chamberlains, of His Holiness the Pope, have the title of *Monsignore*. Prelates are addressed as *Right Rev. Mgr.*, Chamberlains as *Very Rev. Mgr.*

Monsignore when followed by surname is usually written and pronounced *Monsignor*.

MITRED ABBOTS.—*The Right Rev. Abbot* [name]; *Right Rev. Father*.

PROVINCIALS of Religious Congregations.—*The Very Rev. Father* [name]; or *The Very Rev. Father Provincial* (with initials of the Religious Order).

RECTORS OF COLLEGES and Heads of Religious Houses are usually addressed as *Very Rev.*

DEAN.—The use of this as a title is apt to be misleading and should be avoided.

XVI. THE PIOUS ASSOCIATION OF THE HOLY FAMILY.

FORM OF CONSECRATION OF A CHRISTIAN FAMILY TO THE HOLY FAMILY.

O Jesus, our most loving Redeemer, who didst come into the world to enlighten it by Thy teaching and by Thy example, and who didst will to pass the greater part of Thy mortal life in the poor cottage of Nazareth, in humble subjection to Mary and Joseph, thus sanctifying that Family which was to be the model of all Christian families: graciously receive this family, which dedicates and consecrates itself to Thee this day. Do Thou protect us, do Thou watch over us! Do Thou bestow upon us Thy holy fear, peace, concord, and Christian love; that so, by the imitation of Thy Family as our pattern and model, we may each and all obtain everlasting happiness.

O Mary, loving Mother of Jesus and our Mother, by thy gracious intercession make this humble dedication acceptable to Jesus, and obtain for us His graces and blessings.

S. Joseph, holy Guardian of Jesus and Mary, assist us by thy prayers in all our spiritual and temporal necessities; so that, with Mary and with thee, we may for all eternity bless and thank our Divine Redeemer, Jesus.

XVII. REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS

EXCERPTS FROM CHILDREN ACT, 1908

Sec. 66 (1). The Court of Justice, in determining the certified school to which a youthful offender or child is to be sent, shall endeavour to ascertain the religious persuasion to which the offender or child belongs, and the detention order shall, where practicable, specify the religious persuasion to which the offender or child appears to belong, and a school conducted in accordance with that persuasion shall, where practicable, be selected.

(3) Where an order has been made for sending a youthful offender or child to a certified school, which is not conducted in accordance with the religious persuasion to which the offender belongs, the parent, legal guardian, nearest adult relative, or person entitled to the custody of the offender or child may apply—

(a) if the detention order was made by a . . . court acting in and for the place in and for which the court which made the order acted; and

(b) in any other case, to the Secretary of State to remove or send the offender or child to a certified school conducted in accordance with the offender's or child's religious persuasion, and the Court or Secretary of State shall, on proof of the offender's or child's religious persuasion, comply with the request of the applicant:

Provided that—

- (i) the application must be made before the offender or child has been sent to a certified school, or within thirty days after his arrival at the school, and
- (ii) the applicant must show to the satisfaction of the Court or Secretary of State that the managers of the school named by him are willing to receive the offender or child:
- (iii) nothing in this section shall be construed as preventing any such person as aforesaid from making an application to the Secretary of State after the expiration of the said period of thirty days to exercise the powers of transfer conferred on him by the other provisions of this Act.

There is a Catholic Certified Reformatory School for boys at Westthorn, Parkhead, Glasgow.

There are Catholic Certified Industrial Schools for boys at Bishopbriggs, Glasgow; Slatefield Street, Glasgow; and Tranent (Mr William Considine, S.S.C., 2 Queen Street, Edinburgh, Secretary and Treasurer); for girls at 74 Abercromby Street, Glasgow, and Nazareth House, Claremont Street, Aberdeen.

XVIII. CELEBRATIONS FOR DECEASED CLERGYMEN.

By a rule immemorially observed in the Mission of Scotland, every Missionary belonging to it offered up three Masses for the soul of each Bishop or Priest who died attached to the Mission. In consequence of the greatly increased number of Clergymen, this rule was modified in 1847 by the Vicars Apostolic, by authority of the Holy See, in so far that every Missionary was bound to celebrate thrice for those belonging to his own District, and once for those who had served in another District. Lastly, in virtue of a Papal Rescript of 20th June 1879, the rule was again altered by the Archbishops and Bishops, to the effect that every Missionary is obliged to celebrate thrice for a deceased Missionary of his own Diocese, and once for one of any other diocese.

XXII. VICARS-APOSTOLIC IN SCOTLAND.

FROM THE EXTINCTION OF THE HIERARCHY IN 1603 TILL ITS RESTORATION IN 1878.

1. The ancient Hierarchy ended with JAMES BETOUN, Abp. of Glasgow, who died at Paris on the 25th April 1603, aged 79. After being subjected to the jurisdiction of the Archpriests and first Vicar-Apostolic of England till 1623, and afterwards to local Prefects of the Mission, the Clergy were incorporated into a missionary body by decree of *Propaganda*, 1653, and governed by the following *Prefects-Apostolic*—WILLIAM BANNATYNE (or *Bellenden*), 1653-61; ALEXANDER DUNBAR (or *Winstler*), 1662-68, 1672-94; and JOHN WALKER (or *Ross*), 1668-71. In May 1694 a Scottish *Vicariate-Apostolic* was established. This was divided into two *Districts*, the *Lowland* and the *Highland*, in February 1731; and these into three, the *Eastern*, *Western*, and *Northern*, by Papal Rescript of 18th February 1827. This last arrangement remained in force till the re-establishment of the Hierarchy by the Apostolic Letter *Ex supremo Apostolatus apice*, 4th March 1878.

The See of the Isles (*Insularum*, or *Sodorensis*) is said to have been founded about 447 by ST PATRICK, who consecrated GERMANUS, its first Bishop; was united to *Man* till the end of the 14th century; and was vacant for 325 years, from the death of RODERICK MACLEAN in 1553.

SECT. I.

THE CATHOLIC HIERARCHY.

THE Catholic Hierarchy, or the governing body of the Holy Catholic Church, consists of: 1. His Holiness the Sovereign Pontiff, assisted by the Sacred College of Cardinals, and by the Sacred Congregations (of which the Cardinals are the chief members), the Tribunals, and the Offices, of the Roman Curia; 2. the Patriarchs, Archbishops and Bishops; 3. the Apostolic Delegates, Vicars and Prefects; and 4. certain Abbots and Prelates.

I. GENERAL SUMMARY.

Sees, *Latin*, *Greco-Melchite*, *Maronite*, and *Syriac*; Constantinople, *Latin*; and Jerusalem, *Latin*. The less are those of: Babylon, *Chaldaic*; Cilicia, *Armenian*; the East Indies, *Latin*; Lisbon, *Latin*; Venice, *Latin*; and the West Indies, *Latin*.

This summary of *Residential Sees* of Archbishops and Bishops, amounting with the 14 Patriarchal Sees to 1073, is for the most part taken from the official *Annuario Pontificio*, published at Rome in 1914.

Besides the *Residential Sees*, there are many *Titular Sees*, formerly (until March 3, 1882) called *Sees in partibus infidelium*, that is, Sees in infidel regions, the Archbishops and Bishops of which only take their title from them without being bound to

residence. These Sees are, for the most part, assigned to Archbishops and Bishops appointed, either to Apostolic Delegations, Vicariates, or Prefectures; or to the office of Coadjutor, Auxiliary, or Administrator of a Diocese.—The number of Titular Sees is 546. Many are vacant.

II. THE SOVEREIGN PONTIFF.

HIS HOLINESS POPE BENEDICT XV. (JAMES DELLA CHIESA), the 259th Roman Pontiff, was born at Genoa, November 21, 1854; ordained Priest, December 21, 1878; consecrated Archbishop of Bologna, December 22, 1907; created Cardinal, May 25, 1914; elected Pope, September 3, and crowned September 6, 1914.

III. THE SACRED COLLEGE OF CARDINALS.

The Cardinals, as the advisers and assistants of the Sovereign Pontiff, are the Supreme council or senate of the Church. On the death of the Pontiff, they elect his successor.

There are three orders of Cardinals, *Bishops*, *Priests*, and *Deacons*. These orders are distinct from those of the Hierarchy: with very few exceptions, the Cardinal Priests are archbishops or bishops; and the Cardinal Deacons are generally priests.

The Sacred College, when complete, consists of 70 members; 6 Cardinal Bishops, whose dioceses are the six "Suburban Sees," near Rome; 50 Cardinal Priests, who take their title from the "Titular Churches," to which they are appointed, with jurisdiction and right to a throne, etc., therein; and 14 Cardinal Deacons, who are appointed to other churches called "Deaconries."

The first Cardinal Bishop is *Dean*, the first of the Priests is *First Priest*, and the first of the Deacons is *First Deacon*, of the Sacred College. The Dean has the right of consecrating, and the First Deacon the right of proclaiming and crowning, a new Pope.

On the death of the Pontiff the Cardinal *Camerlengo* has the administration of the public affairs of the Holy See.

The "creation" of a Cardinal sometimes precedes, even by several years, its "publication" or proclamation. The Cardinal is then said to be "reserved *in petto*," and, when proclaimed, he takes precedence according to date of creation.

There are now † 60 Cardinals, and 10 vacancies in the Sacred College. Of the Cardinals now living, 18 were created by Leo XIII.; and 42 by Pius X. Four Cardinals have died during the present Pontificate.

Of the 60 Cardinals, 29 are Italian, 8 Austrian, German, or Hungarian; 6 French, 4 British subjects, 5 Spanish, 2 Portuguese, 3 of the United States, 1 Belgian, 1 Dutch, and 1 Brazilian.

Of the 45 Cardinal Priests, 2 are Patriarchs; 28 are Archbishops, and 3 Bishops, of Residential Sees; and the 12 others have received episcopal consecration; so that, including the 6 Cardinal Bishops 51 Cardinals are Patriarchs, Archbishops, or Bishops.

IV. THE ROMAN CURIA.

The Roman Curia, as re-constituted by the Apostolic Constitution *Sapienti consilio* (29th June 1908) of Pope Pius X., consists of the following Sacred Congregations, Tribunals, and Offices.

SACRED CONGREGATIONS,

And the Matters with which they have to deal.

1. *Congregations of the Holy Office.* The protection of faith and morals; the judging of heresy; the doctrine and the use of Indulgences; impediments to Marriage with non-Catholics; dogmatic teaching as to Marriage and other Sacraments.

2. *Consistorial Congregation.* The preparation of matter for Consistories; the erection and division of dioceses, etc., and the election of Bishops. Also whatever relates to the government of dioceses not subject to the *Propaganda*; to the reports of Bishops concerning the state of their dioceses; to apostolic visitations; and to the direction, temporal administration and studies of seminaries.

3. *Congregation of Sacramental Discipline.* Legislation as to the administration and reception of the Sacraments; dispensations from impediments to Marriage and to Ordination, and in regard to the Blessed Eucharist; questions as to the validity of Marriages and of Ordinations.

4. *Congregation of the Council.* The observance of precepts of the Church and dispensations therein. Regulations as to parish priests and Canons; to pious associations, pious bequests, and pious works; to benefices, ecclesiastical property, etc. Also whatever relates to the celebration of Councils and their ratification, and to meetings and conferences of Bishops.

5. *Congregation for the Affairs of Religious.* The Regulation of matters between Bishops and Religious, and amongst Religious themselves, including persons who, without vows, live a community life, or are secular members of Third Orders. Also the granting of dispensations to Religious.

6. *Congregation "de Propaganda Fide."* Having jurisdiction over missionary countries, including however many regions where hierarchies are established. From this jurisdiction the United Kingdom, Holland, Luxemburg, Canada, Newfoundland, and the United States, have recently been withdrawn.—With the *Propaganda* is united a Congregation for the Oriental Rites, and a Commission for the union of dissenting Churches.

7. *Congregation of the Index.* The examination, and (in concert with the Holy Office) the prohibition, of books dangerous to faith or otherwise pernicious.

8. *Congregation of Sacred Rites.* The care and regulation of rites and ceremonies ; the beatification and canonisation of Saints ; and whatever relates to sacred relics.

9. *Congregation of the Ceremonial.* The regulation of papal ceremonies ; of sacred functions performed by Cardinals ; and of the precedence of Cardinals, and of envoys to the Holy See.

10. *Congregation for Extraordinary Ecclesiastical Affairs.* The consideration of matters submitted to its examination by the Supreme Pontiff through the Cardinal Secretary of State ; especially those connected with civil laws, or relating to agreements made with civil powers.

11. *Congregation of Studies.* The regulation of university and other studies ; the granting of power to confer degrees, etc.

TRIBUNALS.

Besides the Archbishops and Bishops of the 144 *residential* Sees, 44 Vicars-Apostolic are Bishops of *titular* Sees. There is also a Bishop of a *titular* See for the Ruthenians in Canada.

Two Episcopal Sees are vacant.

Including 3 Delegates-Apostolic, 4 Archbishops-Coadjutor, 4 Bishops-Coadjutor, 12 Bishops-Auxiliary, and 1 Ruthenian Bishop, the number of Archbishops and Bishops now holding episcopal office in the British Empire is 209. There are also a few *retired*, or without episcopal office, of whom two are in England.

CATHOLIC POPULATION OF THE EMPIRE.

The Catholic population of the British Empire is estimated as follows :—

In the United Kingdom, 5,862,085 (*viz.*, Great Britain, 2,619,415 ; Ireland, 3,242,670) ; Gibraltar, Cyprus, Malta and Gozo, 219,593 ; Asia, 2,306,862 ; Africa, 522,399 ; America, 3,291,117 ; Australasia, New Zealand, and other Islands, 1,184,509 ; total Catholics in the Empire, 13,386,565.

POSTAL REGULATIONS.

INLAND LETTERS FOR THE UNITED KINGDOM.

When prepaid, not above 4 oz., 1d. ; for every additional 2 oz., $\frac{1}{2}$ d. Inland letters must not exceed 2 feet in length, 1 foot in width, or 1 foot in depth, unless official letters sent to or from a Government Office.

LETTERS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

To British Colonies and possessions abroad, to Egypt, the United States of America, and the places in China and Morocco where there are British Post Office Agencies, the postage is 1d. the ounce. To Foreign Countries, with the above exceptions, $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. the first ounce, and 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for each additional ounce.

POST-CARDS (INLAND).

The prepaid rate of postage on every post-card is $\frac{1}{2}$ d., and on every reply post-card 1d. Post-cards must be made of ordinary cardboard, not thicker than the thickest, nor thinner than the thinnest, official post-card. They must not exceed $5\frac{1}{2}$ in. by $3\frac{1}{2}$ in., nor be less than 4 in. by $2\frac{3}{4}$ in. The left-hand half of the address side may bear a written or printed communication.

POST-CARDS TO THE COLONIES AND FOREIGN COUNTRIES.

Post-cards for a destination outside the United Kingdom are charged at the rate of 1d. for a single post-card and 2d. for a reply post-card. They must be similar in size and substance to the official post-card, and must have the title "POST-CARD" printed or written on the address side. Post-cards for any British Possession and certain Foreign Countries may bear a written or printed communication on the left-hand half of the address side.

HALFPENNY PACKET POST.

This post to be used only for packets not exceeding 2 oz. in weight, and is intended for the transmission of printed or written matter not in the nature of a letter. Size not to exceed 2 ft. in length, or 1 foot in width or depth.

NEWSPAPERS (INLAND).

For every registered newspaper, with or without a supplement, $\frac{1}{2}$ d. ; but a packet, containing two or more newspapers, is not liable

to a higher postage than would be charged on a book-packet or letter of the same weight. Every packet must be open at both ends, and must have no enclosure, except its supplement or supplements. To places abroad, the postage is $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for every 2 oz. Weight not to exceed 5 lb.

UNPAID

inland letters, halfpenny packets, and newspapers are charged with double postage, and if *insufficiently stamped*, with double the deficiency.

REGISTRATION.

Prepaid letters, newspapers, and printed papers and commercial papers may be registered for the United Kingdom, and for almost all places abroad, for a fee of 2d.

PARCEL POST (INLAND).

The greatest length allowed is 3 feet 6 inches, the greatest length and girth combined, 6 feet. The greatest weight allowed is 11 lb. The rates are :—

MONEY ORDERS.

For inland money orders the charge is : for sums not exceeding £1, 2d. ; above £1 and not exceeding £3, 3d. ; above £3, and not exceeding £10, 4d. ; above £10, and not exceeding £20, 6d. ; above £20, and not exceeding £30, 8d. ; above £30, and not exceeding £40, 10d.

POSTAL ORDERS

are issued for any value, mounting by sixpence, from 6d. to 19s. 6d. inclusive, and for 20s. and 21s., at the following rates of poundage : 6d. to 2s. 6d., $\frac{1}{2}$ d. ; 3s. to 15s., 1d. ; 15s. 6d. to 21s., $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Broken amounts, but not fractions of a penny, may be made up by the use of stamps not exceeding fivepence in value or three in number affixed to the face of any postal order.

POST OFFICE SAVINGS BANKS.

1s. and upwards received at an interest of $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. (or 6d. for every pound) per annum.

When the original Inventory was recorded after 1st June 1881, the 44 Vict., cap. 12, sec. 41, provides that the 1 per cent. Legacy and Succession Duty payable by children and others, under the Legacy and Succession Duty Act, is not payable in respect of any personal property included in the Inventory, and on which the Stamp Duty has been paid (sec. 41). This does not apply to Legacies or Successions out of heritable property or out of foreign assets, or to heritable property; nor does it apply to the duties payable by the other relatives of the deceased or strangers in blood: the Legacy and Succession Duties payable by those persons remain the same.

Sec. 42 of the above Act charges pecuniary legacies and shares of residue below £20 in value, where the deceased died on or after 1st June 1881, with the duty imposed by the Legacy Duty Acts, subject to the relief granted by sec. 13 of the 43 Vict., cap. 14 and “as modified by this Act” (see secs. 33 and 36).

Sec. 38, sub-section 2, charges with duty “any property taken as a *donatio mortis causa* made by any person dying on or after the 1st day of June 1881, or taken under a voluntary disposition, made by any person so dying, purporting to operate as an immediate gift *inter vivos* whether by way of transfer, delivery, declaration of trust or otherwise, which shall not have been *bona fide* made three months before the death of the deceased.”

Sec. 11 of 52 Vict., cap. 7, amends sub-sec. 2 of section 38 of 44 Vict., cap. 12, by substituting “twelve” months in place of “three” months before the death of the deceased, and “the description of property shall include property taken under any gift whenever made, of which property *bona fide* possession and enjoyment shall not have been assumed by the donee immediately upon the gift and thenceforward retained to the entire exclusion of the donor, or of any benefit to him by contract or otherwise.”

PART V.

I. CHURCH OPENINGS, &c.

24th December 1913.—Opening of New Church
in the Island of Vatersay.

Christmas Eve, 1913, served occasion for the opening of a new church on the little island of Vatersay, which lies in the Barra group of the long chain of the Outer Hebrides. Dedicated to "Our Lady of the Waves" and St John, it looks across the waters of the bay to the parent church of Our Lady "Star of the Sea," which crests the village of Castlebay, on the main island of Barra.

At the beginning of the eighteenth century, there appears to have been a considerable number of people resident on Vatersay, Catholics of course, as is the entire native population of the Barra group of islands. Bishop Nicholson in 1700, and a few years later Bishop Gordon, spent some days there, "catechising and instructing the people" in the course of their missionary tours through the Highlands. The former Vicar Apostolic mentions the existence of a "Chapel" on Vatersay, but it is remarkable that every trace of such a building should have disappeared, so that it is to-day impossible to point the site even to the old "tigh-pobull" (lit., meeting-house), to which the Bishop would appear to refer. About a hundred years later the whole population was forcibly removed to the still more remote island of Mingulay, and Vatersay became and continued as a deserted sheep-farm for a hundred years more. In 1908 it formed the scene of the "Vatersay Raid," the outcome of which was its purchase by Government, and its being re-peopled by some sixty families, for the most part the descendants of its original possessors.

The population of the island now numbers nearly 300, to whom the provision of a church of their own was a something to be desired and prayed for since the inception of the settlement. To the charity of the Dowager Marchioness of Bute they owe the

fulfilment of their hopes, and her name will ever be remembered with gratitude by the islanders.

The building is a neat composite structure of wood and iron, capable of seating 250, annexed to which is suitable accommodation to serve the needs of a priest during his stay on the island. The season of the year as well as the isolated character of Vatersay made a celebration of the usual nature impracticable. Accordingly the church was quietly blessed by the priest of the mission previous to the celebration of Midnight Mass. At the two subsequent Masses on Christmas Day nearly all the islanders made their Communions in thanksgiving for the event, and for the intentions of their benefactors.

Thus in the remote island of Vatersay, after a hundred years of desolation, is the Mass once more revived among a people who are as true and loyal to the Faith as their fathers have ever been.

29th March 1914.—Opening of new Chapel-school at
Kelty, Fife.

Kelty was established as a separate mission in 1912, and already a serviceable chapel-school has been erected to meet the growing wants of the young congregation. It was opened for divine worship on Passion Sunday last, Mgr. Morris, V.G., blessing the building and thereafter celebrating *Missa cantata*, Fr. Hogan of Lochgelly assisting. The sermon on the occasion was preached by Fr. O'Keefe. The building, which comprises five class-rooms, central hall, and other appurtenances, is a wood-framed erection, covered with cement slabs and rough-cast asbestos slates. Inside it is lined with wood, painted a pleasant shade of green. Altogether it presents a neat and comfortable appearance. It was designed and constructed by Messrs Thomson & Co., composite builders, Edinburgh. The school was opened on the 3rd September, and already there is an attendance of 139. —[*Communicated.*]

9th June.—Consecration of Right Rev. James W. M'Carthy,
Bishop of Galloway.

Some five short months ago the ancient See of Galloway, redolent with memories of many of the life struggles of that heroic and saintly missionary of the fourth century, St Ninian, was plunged into the direst sorrow by the death of the much-

lamented Bishop William Turner, but on Tuesday, 9th June, that sadness was turned to joy in the realisation that once more a Bishop according to the heart of the Sovereign Pontiff was consecrated to the charge of this extensive and historic See. The appointment of the Right Rev. James W. M'Carthy to the Bishopric gave the sincerest pleasure, not only to his numerous friends in Glasgow and throughout the West of Scotland generally, but to the good people of Dumfries and neighbourhood, who from time to time had heard of the abilities of the distinguished clergyman who had been wisely chosen to carry on the traditions of the Galloway Diocese. A native of Newcastle-on-Tyne, where he was born on the 30th January 1853, Bishop M'Carthy went through the usual course at Blairs and at the Scots College, Valladolid, finishing his ecclesiastical studies at St Peter's College, Partickhill. His ordination to the priesthood took place on 4th May 1879, in St Andrew's Pro-Cathedral, Glasgow, the scene in later years of his brilliant administrative work. After serving as assistant at St Mary's, Glasgow, and at Kinning Park, he was given charge of Port-Glasgow in 1884, where he remained for fifteen years. After a year at Pollokshaws he was in 1900 appointed to the Cathedral at Glasgow. Bishop M'Carthy's years of fruitful labour for the Church in the great commercial capital of the country will remain in itself a sufficient monument to perpetuate his work in the memory of his old friends—Catholic and non-Catholic alike. He comes to Dumfries fully equipped by training for the onerous responsibilities of his high office as a shepherd of souls. But he comes strong also with the vigour of youth. Tuesday was a day to be remembered by the Catholics of the South. The presence of so many of Bishop M'Carthy's friends from near and far in the Pro-Cathedral of St Andrew was a tribute at once to the universal esteem in which he is held and to the eagerness with which his new flock gathered to greet their Bishop on the day of his solemn consecration.

His Grace the Archbishop of St Andrews and Edinburgh presided in the Sanctuary. The consecrating Bishop was Archbishop Mackintosh, Coadjutor of Glasgow, and the assistants, Bishop Smith of Argyll and the Isles, and Bishop Keily of Plymouth. The latter preached an instructive sermon on the "Making of a Bishop." After the ceremony luncheon was served in the Cathedral Hall to the clergy and invited guests in attendance. In the evening a great demonstration in the Mechanics' Hall gave the welcome of the laity to the new Bishop.—[Extracted from the *Catholic Herald*.]

1st September.—Opening of New Schools at the
Cathedral, Edinburgh.

On the 1st September new schools were blessed and opened by Mgr. Morris, V.G., assisted by Canon Stuart and the other priests of the Cathedral. A large portion of the old school had been destroyed by fire. Plans for the new buildings were prepared by Mr A. Macpherson, 7 Young Street, Edinburgh, and carried out at a cost of £6000. Accommodation has been supplied for 750 pupils. The very best educational conditions have been obtained, and it would be difficult to conceive any school of the size more satisfactory or more up to date in all requisites for the comforts of teachers and pupils. About £850 was received from Fire Insurance Co. for damage done to the old building by fire, and about £1200 have been raised up to date by efforts of the Congregation.

15th October.—Consecration of the Right Rev. John Toner,
Bishop of Dunkeld.

The consecration of the new Bishop had been fixed for a much earlier date, but, owing to unforeseen causes, had to be postponed. He had indeed been nominated Bishop of Dunkeld as far back as the 17th July, but the unexpected death of Pope Pius X. intervened before the necessary documents were expedited, and the election of a successor was necessary before that formality could be completed. The Bulls of nomination were at length issued on the 8th September, but their transmission was considerably delayed by the state of war already existing. They arrived, however, in time to allow the consecration to take place, by a happy augury, on the 15th October, the feast of St Teresa, whose words—“*Solo Dios basta*”—form the motto of the Bishop's escutcheon. The delay did little to interfere with the solemnity of the ceremony, except that there was not so large a gathering of the clergy as had originally intended to come. The Mass was a low one, but notwithstanding that, the ceremonial was carried out with the utmost impressiveness. The consecrating Prelate was Metropolitan, Archbishop Smith of St Andrews and Edinburgh, assisted by Archbishop Mackintosh, Coadjutor of Glasgow, and Right Rev. James W. M'Carthy, the recently consecrated Bishop of Galloway. Occupying places in the Sanctuary were the Bishop of Argyll and the Isles and the Bishop of Aberdeen, the latter of whom preached an eloquent sermon on the position and dignity of the Episcopate, and spoke of the many qualifications the new

Bishop possessed for a worthy discharge of the sacred office. "You have a Bishop who will do great things for the Diocese of Dunkeld. You know the saying, 'The child is father of the man.' John Toner was a model student: his superiors and classmates bear testimony to it. Father Toner was a model priest: his Bishop, his fellow priests bear testimony to it. Bishop Toner will be a model Bishop. I do not prophesy: his past bears testimony to it."

The new Bishop is in his 57th year, being born in Glasgow on the 14th March 1857. His education was received at Blairs and the Scots College, Valladolid. He was ordained at Valencia on the 25th March 1882. He served as assistant at St Lawrence's, Greenock, till 1887. The next three years he passed as Professor at St Peter's College, Partick. In 1890 he was placed in charge of St Michael's, Parkhead, and in 1897 of St Patrick's, Glasgow. He has been at Rutherglen since 1901. He was appointed a Canon of the Glasgow Chapter in 1902. He has for many years been recognised as one in the foremost ranks of educationists. Thus he brings to his new charge a long and wide experience of every class of priestly work, and all who know him wish him long and fruitful years in the episcopal office.

25th October.—Centenary celebrations at St Mary's Cathedral, Edinburgh.

Sunday, 25th October, was a red-letter day in the history of Catholicity in the East of Scotland. The grey old Cathedral of St Mary's, Broughton Street, resounded with the "Te Deum" of thanksgiving for the graces and benefits of a hundred years of strenuous Faith. The day marked the hundredth anniversary of the foundation of the edifice. The celebrations were on a scale befitting the significance of the event. These, however, were of a purely religious character, though the original scheme drawn up by Canon Stuart, with the sanction of his Grace the Archbishop, included several important social functions, but in respect that many of the Cathedral parishioners are fighting their country's battle, and that others have fallen in this European Armageddon, all social functions were abandoned. Efforts therefore were directed to a magnificent religious ceremonial, and this was accomplished with great success. It is worthy of note that the number of communicants at the early Masses was exceedingly large, in respect, no doubt, of the wish of the Administrator that the congregation might offer Communion for the repose of the souls of the brave and zealous clergy who in the past had discharged so well the onerous duties of their office. At eleven

o'clock, before a crowded congregation, Pontifical High Mass was celebrated by his Lordship the Bishop of Galloway, in the presence of his Grace the Archbishop of St Andrews and Edinburgh. Mgr. Morris, V.G., acted as assistant at the throne, and Very Rev. Canon Macdonald and Very Rev. Canon Stuart, deacons. The Abbot of Fort-Augustus and Very Rev. Father O'Reilly, O.M.I., occupied seats in the sanctuary. The altar was magnificently decorated with flowers. From the conclusion of High Mass until the evening service, there was Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament.

The Abbot of Fort Augustus was the preacher on the occasion, and in the course of an interesting survey of the past, said :—

“ He did not know whether a detailed history of St Mary's had ever been written, but much might be said ; they might speak of the zealous and pious and learned Bishops, one after the other, who in God's own time had fixed there their Episcopal Sees, the names of Cameron, Carruthers, Gillies, Strain, Smith, and M'Donald, one after the other, who, following Our Lord's injunction, fed the lambs and the sheep of Christ, and speak of the many events of which that church had been witness : great ecclesiastical ceremonies, Consecrations, Confirmations, and Jubilees ; of those great gatherings of the Faithful who gathered together to worship God in joy and to thank Him for His graces and blessings. Then there was the material progress of that church, the great zeal of administrators and people in fitting that church from time to time until it was regarded as one of the most beautiful churches in the country. All that would supply much interesting material. He believed there were many reasons in that reverent retrospect for loving gratitude to God. He preferred, however, to look further back than that, and in order to lead to that spirit of gratitude he asked them to carry their thoughts back with him to the time when the building of that church was first in contemplation. What a wonderful contrast they would see between what was almost slavery then and freedom now. He asked them to carry their thoughts back over that hundred years and consider that time when one of the greatest, most pious, and most learned Bishops who ever ruled in the Scottish Church was Bishop in this capital city of Scotland. The name of George Hay cannot be mentioned even in Edinburgh without a feeling of reverence and gratitude for what he had been privileged to do for religion. When they thought of the times in which he lived their wonder was deepened more, and they marvelled that God in those days wrought good out of evil and allowed His Church still to exist and flourish in the hearts of men when for a time it seemed as though it had disappeared for ever. Some twenty years before it was in contemplation to build that chapel on that site, George Hay had been consecrated a Bishop of the Scottish Church, and here in Edinburgh fixed his residence in that historic street, the Blackfriars Wynd, a name

that carried them farther back than the destruction of the old religion, to the days when the White Friars had their church and gardens on the spot, and where many of the great Scottish nobles resided—the Morays, the Mortons, and the Beaton, who gave Archbishops and Cardinals to the Scottish Church. The glory of that street had departed, and in those towering lands, on which still might be traced the grandeur of former days, George Hay took up his residence after his consecration. The two or three rooms below him were made into a humble chapel, where the mysteries of the Mass were celebrated and the Faithful instructed. That time was perhaps the very darkest moment of the dark history of Holy Church since the destruction of the old religion in the sixteenth century. The Scottish Church for 200 years had lived as it were in the Catacombs. Catholics were then a mere handful: the whole Church, north, south, east, and west, was no larger than one of the great Missions in Glasgow a few years ago, ministered to by less than 30 priests, some 20 seculars and 8 or 9 Jesuit Fathers up and down the country. During this time the Penal Laws became heavier and heavier, and more bitter and more vindictive." And the speaker proceeded to describe how, under the pressure of national needs, these were gradually relaxed.

The preacher in the evening was the Right Rev. James W. M'Carthy, Bishop of Galloway. A collection made in the course of the day realised £300.—[From the *Catholic Herald*.]

8th November.—Opening of New Chapel-school at
Lowvalleyfield.

The new chapel-school at Lowvalleyfield was opened on Sunday, 8th November, by his Lordship Bishop Toner of Dunkeld, in presence of a large congregation. The building is a handsome structure overlooking the River Forth, on the Culross side. It is situated on the main road between High and Low Valleyfield, and is intended to suit the wants of a wide district, extending as far as Kincardine. It is built in the most modern style, and while accommodating at the moment something like 130 children, is capable of housing double that number. Prior to its erection, Father Kilcullen, who is in charge, celebrated Mass in an apartment in one of the model lodging-houses, but this by no means suited the wants of a growing district, and as there was clamant need for a school for the education of the Catholic children, it was decided to erect the present handsome chapel-school.

As showing the interest taken in Sunday's event, we may mention that two motor char-a-bancs arrived with a contingent of

Catholics from Alloa, one from Cowdenbeath, and two from Kincardine, and other parties from farther afield.

High Mass was celebrated by Father Kilcullen, with Canon Dowling as deacon and Father M'Daniel subdeacon. Canon Turner was master of ceremonies. Bishop Toner presided, and was accompanied by Canon M'Donald.

After the first Gospel his Lordship addressed the congregation, and congratulated them on the work they had accomplished, and encouraged them to new efforts in the future. There was Pontifical Benediction in the evening.—[From the *Catholic Herald*.]

Catechising work at Dunbar, East Linton, and Duns.

Mrs Francis Kerr, and ladies associated with her, have at their disposal varied sums of money, which have made it possible to rent a house at Dunbar for Sisters to come every week to take over the catechising of the children, and for general visitation purposes throughout this wide district, including the whole of Berwickshire and a considerable part of East Lothian. The Ursulines from St Margaret's, Edinburgh, at great inconvenience and no little expense to themselves, have generously undertaken the work. Sisters come to Dunbar every week-end throughout the year, to give catechism in many centres in the district. They travel to all the services on Sunday in the different stations, catechising, instructing, and attending to all who may need their assistance during Mass and Benediction. They also look after the membership and meetings of the Sacred Heart Sodality. It is impossible to speak too highly of the excellent work of these zealous nuns, or to express the indebtedness of the Mission to the Mother-General for her kindness in arranging to have this work done. Three or four Sisters spend the summer holiday time at their house at Dunbar, gathering children in relays from remote parts of the district. These they keep at their house, giving them instructions and bringing them to Mass and the Sacraments daily. Many of these children have ordinarily no opportunity of getting to Mass during the whole year.—[*Communicated*.]

II. ORDINATIONS.

The Rev. JOHN ASHE was born on the 27th November 1889 at Ryepatch, Co. Nevada, U.S.A. Educated at the Christian Brothers' Schools, Dingle, Co. Kerry, he entered St Brendan's Seminary, Killarney, in 1906, and two years later passed to St Peter's, New Kilpatrick, where his studies were completed. He received tonsure on the 19th June 1913, minor orders on the following day, subdiaconate on the 28th September, and diaconate on the 21st December, of the same year. On the 28th June 1914 he was raised to the priesthood in St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow. All orders were conferred by Archbishop Mackintosh. He is assistant at St Patrick's, Glasgow.

The Rev. PETER BOLAND was born at Blennerville, Tralee, Co. Kerry, on the 31st January 1891. He studied classics at St Michael's College, Listowel, and St Brendan's Seminary, Killarney. He went to St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick in August 1908. The dates of his orders are the same as in the preceding notice. He is one of the assistants at St Alphonsus', Glasgow.

The Rev. WILLIAM BRADLEY was born in Glasgow on the 14th July 1890. He entered Blairs College on the 29th August 1903. In October 1908 he proceeded to Issy, and two years later to the Sulpician Seminary at Paris. He received tonsure in June 1909, minor orders in June 1911, the subdiaconate in June 1912, and diaconate in the following December. He was raised to the priesthood by Archbishop Mackintosh on the 28th September 1913, at St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick. He is stationed at Clydebank.

The Rev. ANDREW CAMERON was born at Simla, India, on the 12th November 1887. He entered Blairs College in 1903, passing two years later to the Scots College, Valladolid, and to the Scots College, Rome, in 1907. He received tonsure and minor orders in 1911, subdiaconate on the 18th November 1912, diaconate on the 21st December following, and was raised to the priesthood on the 8th June 1913. He is one of the assistants at the Cathedral, Aberdeen.

The Rev. JOHN CONWAY was born in Glasgow on the 2nd August 1888. In September 1904 he entered Blairs College, Issy in 1908, and St Peter's College, New Kilpatrick, in 1911. For dates of Ordination, see under Rev. John Ashe. He is assistant at Hamilton.

The Rev. JAMES DOLAN was born in Glasgow on the 2nd February 1888. After spending some time at St Aloysius', Glasgow, he entered Blairs in 1903, and three years later St Peter's New Kilpatrick. For subsequent dates, see under the Rev J. Ashe.

The Rev. MARTIN DOYLE was born at Port-Glasgow on the 20th December 1888. He entered Blairs College on the 6th September 1902, and was transferred four years later to the Scots College, Rome. He received tonsure and minor orders in 1911 from Archbishop Ceppetelli. He was ordained subdeacon on All Saints 1913, deacon on the 7th March 1914, and priest on the 11th April following,—all at the hands of Cardinal Pompili, Vicar of Rome. He is stationed at the Pro-Cathedral, Dumfries.

The Rev. ALEXANDER FERGUSON, D.D., was born at Braemar on the 31st July 1888. He entered Blairs College in September 1903; in November 1908 was transferred to the Propaganda College, Rome. Here he received the subdiaconate in July 1913, and diaconate in October following, and was ordained priest on the 6th June 1914. Returning to Scotland, he was appointed assistant at the Cathedral, Aberdeen.

The Rev. PETER FITZPATRICK was born on the 22nd March 1888, in the parish of Kilmaine, Co. Mayo. Receiving his early training at St Jarlath's College, Tuam, he entered All Hallows in November 1907, and St Peter's, New Kilpatrick, in August 1908. His dates of ordination are the same as those of Rev. J. Ashe. He is assistant at Tollcross.

The Rev. ALEXANDER HAMILTON was born in Glasgow on the 19th June 1887. After spending two years at St Mungo's Academy, Glasgow, he passed to Blairs College in August 1903, and to St Peter's, New Kilpatrick, in September 1906. For dates of ordination, see the notice of Rev. J. Ashe. He is one of the assistants at Motherwell.

The Rev. SIMON KEANE was born on the 11th February 1888, at Mullagh, Co. Cavan. He was educated at St Marie's College,

Rugby, and St Brendan's Seminary, Killarney. In 1908 he passed to St Peter's, New Kilpatrick. His dates of ordination are the same as those of Rev. J. Ashe.

The Rev. ALEXANDER M'BRIDE was born in Glasgow on the 1st August 1886. After studying at St Aloysius', Glasgow, he entered Blairs College in 1902, and passed to St Peter's, New Kilpatrick, in 1906. For his orders, see the notice of the Rev. J. Ashe.

The Rev. JAMES J. M'GRORY was born at Shettleston on the 2nd October 1887. He entered Blairs College in September 1902, and St Peter's, New Kilpatrick, in 1906. He received tonsure on the 20th December 1913, and minor orders on the day following. He was ordained subdeacon on the 6th, deacon on the 7th, and priest on the 28th June 1914. He is assistant at Cadzow.

The Rev. THOMAS M'GRORY was born at Shettleston on the 31st July 1889. Entering Blairs College in 1903, he passed in 1908 to St Sulpice, Issy. He received minor orders on the 10th June 1911, and subdiaconate on the 22nd March 1913, at the hands of Mgr. Le Roy. He was ordained deacon on the 17th May 1913, and priest on the 28th June following, by Cardinal Amette. He was stationed at St Patrick's, Dumbarton.

The Rev. JAMES MACDONALD was born on the 11th June 1888, at Drimnin, Morven, Argyllshire. He entered Blairs College in August 1904. In 1909 he was transferred to St Sulpice, Issy, and when there received the subdiaconate on the 17th May 1913. Passing to the Sulpician Seminary at Paris in October 1913, he was ordained deacon on the 20th December following, and priest on the 4th July 1914, by Cardinal Amette. He is assistant at Mulroy.

The Rev. PATRICK MACDONALD was born at Jochdar, S. Uist, on the 25th December 1888. He entered Blairs College in September 1904, passing in 1909 to Issy, and four years later to St Sulpice, Paris. He was ordained subdeacon on the 11th April 1914, deacon on the 6th June, and priest on the 4th July following, all at the hands of Cardinal Amette. He is stationed at Castlebar, Barra.

The Rev. WALTER L. M'HARDY was born at Braemar on the 29th February 1888. He entered Blairs College in September 1902, and in October 1906 was transferred to the Scots College,

Rome. He received tonsure and minor orders in 1910, subdiaconate on the 1st November 1911, and the diaconate on the 23rd December following, and was ordained priest on the 10th August 1912. Returning to Scotland in the following year, he was for some months serving at Braemar, and in February 1914 was appointed assistant at the Cathedral, Aberdeen.

The Rev. MALCOLM M'KINNON was born in Barra, Inverness-shire, on the 10th July 1889. He entered Blairs College in 1904, passing in 1909 to Issy, where he received tonsure and minor orders. Four years later he was transferred to the Sulpician Seminary at Paris, and there was ordained subdeacon on the 20th December 1913, deacon on the 11th April 1914, and priest on the 4th July following. After serving for a time as assistant at Our Lady and St Margaret's, Kinning Park, Glasgow, he is in interim charge of Eriskay.

The Rev. JOHN J. MURPHY was born at Kendal, Westmoreland, on the 3rd June 1887. After studying at St Mungo's and St Aloysius', Glasgow, he entered Blairs College in 1903, and St Peter's, New Kilpatrick in 1906. For subsequent dates, see the notice of the Rev. J. Ashe. He is stationed at Carfin.

The Rev. MICHAEL O'BRIEN was born on the 27th August 1889 at Cunnavoola, Castlemaine, Co. Kerry. He studied classics at St Brendan's Seminary, Killarney, and philosophy at St Patrick's College, Thurles, which he entered in 1908. Two years later he proceeded to St Peter's, New Kilpatrick. His dates of ordination are the same as those of Rev. J. J. M'Grory. He is assistant at St Mary's, Glasgow.

III. OBITUARY.

Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord. From henceforth now, saith the spirit, that they may rest from their labours; for their works follow them.—APOC. xiv. 13.

It is a holy and wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins.—2 MACHAB. xii. 46.

Pray for the soul of the Right Rev. WILLIAM TURNER, Bishop of Galloway, who died at Dumfries on the 19th January 1914, in the 70th year of his age, the 46th of his priesthood, and the 21st of his episcopate.

The death of Bishop Turner, though he had reached his 70th year, was widely felt to be premature. So youthful almost in appearance was he, so untouched by the decay of age, that, two years before his death, he would have been given a twenty years' lease of life. He had, however, a serious illness; there were ominous symptoms of heart trouble, and it soon became only too clear that his constitution of iron had been undermined. He had frequent rallies, and there were faint hopes of recovery. But the hopes were deceptive. Life, it was now seen, was merely smouldering and despite fitful flashes of his old fire, the end came—almost, however, with a sense of suddenness—on 19th January 1914.

The future Bishop Turner was born, almost at the door of St Peter's, in Chapel Court, Aberdeen, on the 12th December 1844. His early days were spent with grandparents at Glenlivet. The Glen was a congenial atmosphere for the budding life of a Catholic bishop, for it was a sheltered nook in which, throughout the troubles of centuries, the faith had never ceased to live and even flourish. The Mass Rock and the Priests' Hiding-place, in the mountain fastness, still witness of days when it was a crime to say or hear Mass. The vitality of Catholicism in Glenlivet and throughout the county, in modern times, may be gathered from the fact that Banffshire since the Reformation has given about a dozen bishops, and priests in hundreds, to the service of the Church.

It was, then, in this cradle of vocations that the bishop's childhood and boyhood were spent; and it was not, therefore,

to be wondered at that a vocation to the priesthood manifested itself in early youth. He entered upon his studies at Blairs College—the “good old Blairs” of so many vivid memories—on 24th July 1858. He left behind him in the college the name of a student who had been solid and painstaking in his studies. From Blairs he passed to the Scots College, Rome. Those who knew him in later days as the practical, matter-of-fact priest and bishop, have no difficulty in believing that he found his *métier* in philosophy and theology rather than in the finer fancies of the classics. He is described as having been throughout a successful student. He was ordained priest, by Mgr. Villanova Castellacci, on 26th April 1868.

On his return to Scotland he served, for a short time, at Milngavie and at St Mary's, Dundee. He soon, however, found a more permanent sphere of work in St Patrick's, Edinburgh, under Father (afterwards Canon) Hannan—a saintly priest, of whom he ever after spoke with a tenderness of affection which he seldom allowed himself to display. St Patrick's, then as now, was a stronghold of the Faith and a busy centre of Catholic activity; and here the energetic young priest was in his element. and lived laborious days, for eight years. Memories of him, all eloquent of his unwearied zeal, still linger in the courts and alleys of the Cowgate. His successors as curates in St Patrick's have often lit upon those memories of him in the most unlikely places; and have regarded them as proofs that his influence was unusually searching. One fact about him is vividly remembered. There was an epidemic of fever, and Father Turner, who was a frequent visitor in the slums, caught the contagion. Many and fervent were the prayers for his recovery. So wide and deep, and so well-known had the influence of the young priest already become, that the vicissitudes of his illness, with Protestants as well as Catholics, were a matter of public solicitude. It was in St Patrick's he first evinced—what in later days was recognised as a pet religious hobby of his—an enthusiastic interest in the Young Men's Society. In his hands, perhaps more than in anybody else's, the St Patrick's branch of the society became a subject of almost national fame. In his efforts on behalf of young men, as in all his work at St Patrick's, he displayed the energy, habits of method, tenacity of purpose and single-mindedness, which were so characteristic of him in later days. Another trait in his character was his aversion to all public recognition of his work. He left Edinburgh for Dumfries early in 1877; and despite his love of St Patrick's, his popularity there, frequent invitations from troops of friends and the demonstration of affection which he knew awaited him, many years—more, it is said, than twenty years—elapsed ere he revisited the scene of his successful labours.

He was promoted to the charge of St Andrew's, Dumfries, in succession to Father Macdonald, who died on 27th January 1877. He forthwith threw himself, with all the energy of his being, into

the work of the mission. Nor was mission work his sole occupation. In the year following appointment to Dumfries, the Scottish Hierarchy was restored, and the Diocese of Galloway erected, with the Bishop's See at Dumfries. *Dean* Turner, as he had now become, assisted the bishop, the Right Rev. J. M'Lachlan, in the organisation of the new Diocese. So large was the dean's share of this work, that Bishop M'Lachlan, speaking years after of these early years of his episcopate, said in his pawky way: "Dean Turner did the work, and I pocketed all the credit of it." In almost everything, the dean chose to act as the new bishop's factotum. To return, however, to mission or parish work: it would be difficult to instance any mission upon which more care and labour were expended than were bestowed upon Dumfries. Improvements were made in the various mission properties, *e.g.*, the church was repainted, an organ installed, etc.; but he did not set so much store by these achievements. He attached a higher value to the establishment or promotion of societies or confraternities, as so many means of gathering and so securing the spiritual harvest of the mission. He could not do too much for such organisations. The care of the poor, the Catholic education of children, the protection of young men and women from the manifold evil influences of a large town, these objects lay near his heart; and he sedulously fostered such societies as promoted them. It need not be said that the Young Men's Society held a high place in his scheme of spiritual work. He lost no opportunity of recommending it; all his talk on the subject of societies led round to it; it was almost his King Charles's head. He acted as chaplain to the Dumfries branch of it; and, despite the many demands on his time, he was most assiduous in his attendance. He gave sound advice, delivered lectures on a wide variety of subjects, directed the discussion of useful topics, etc. A favourite idea of his, in dealing with young men, was to train, help, and encourage them to play a part by speech and action, in the public life of the community; and in this he had a large measure of success. He did much useful public work himself on the School Board, the Parochial Board, the directorate of the Dumfries and Galloway Infirmary, and other public bodies. The value of his work in these various capacities was thus appraised, on the occasion of his death, by the *Dumfries Standard*: "He earned for himself by his seriousness of purpose, his vigour of intellect, and his unquestioned capacity, the esteem of his colleagues and of the general public." He had a good knowledge of music. In church music he anticipated, in his views, the *Proprio Motu* of Pius X. On one occasion, the St Andrew's Choir, under his conductorship, gave an excellent rendering of the "Messiah," in the Mechanics' Hall, Dumfries.

Bishop M'Lachlan died, after a lingering illness, on 16th January 1903. For some time before his death the bishop was incapacitated, and Dean Turner, as Vicar-General, carried on the

work of the diocese. After the bishop's death, there was little of the usual speculation as to his successor; every finger pointed unhesitatingly to Dean Turner as the future Bishop of Galloway. And public expectation was fulfilled. He was nominated to the See of Galloway by Brief of 16th June 1903, and consecrated on 25th July following, by Archbishop Macdonald. Between these events, amongst other details of preparation, the question of episcopal arms and a motto had to be decided. The arms, it was ascertained, consisted of an escutcheon with a wheel in the centre. The bishop used to tell against himself, that, as to the motto, he consulted the late Lord Bute, who, with a glance at the arms, and in pointed allusion to the bishop's stentorian voice, suggested: *vox tonitrui in rota* (Ps. 76, 19).

His life as a bishop was, *mutatis mutandis*, of a piece with his life as a priest. The special merit of his episcopal career did not lie so much in the number of new missions opened, or churches and schools built, as in the thoroughness with which he entered into every detail of his diocesan duties. From the very outset he strove to put his little diocese on a sound financial basis. This was difficult in a diocese consisting largely of country missions with rapidly thinning populations; and it is not surprising that, while his efforts met with a large measure of success, the success was not in proportion to his efforts.

Churches and schools were built at Annbank and Waterside, and in each of these places there is now a flourishing parish. The churches, in these two cases, were of the useful, rather than the ornamental, type. It was otherwise with a third church, a costly structure, which was built at Troon: it is a gem of architecture. Large schools, to meet the growing needs of large towns and the growing demands of an exacting Education Department, were built, during his episcopate, at Dumfries and Kilmarnock.

As has been said, however, his chief aim as a bishop was not so much the doing of new work as the consolidation and development of work already done; and this aim he strove to achieve by organisation. By pastorals and frequent circulars, by searching visitation and ceaseless correspondence, he endeavoured to make his diocese a model of equipment and efficiency. And he succeeded. This work was almost exclusively his own. He had a Finance Committee, and latterly a Chapter; but he seldom consulted or asked assistance from either; he submitted to them, almost as a formality, the finished results of his own industry. Nor did he seek assistance in the difficult and tedious work of bookkeeping and correspondence. In the last months of his life, when work was almost impossible to him, and manifestly painful, he could not be persuaded to have a secretary.

He used to speak of his diocese as a machine, of which he and his priests were parts. It was a complaint against him, that, in the impetuosity of his own zeal, he sometimes forgot, that the parts of the machine were human beings with human susceptibilities.

He was unwearied in his appeals for the various funds raised to help poor missions, to keep poor schools open, etc. He took a special interest in the collection for the Propagation of the Faith; he pleaded with priests and people for an increase of interest in foreign missions. He knew and allowed for the poverty of his people; yet it was a keen disappointment to him that his diocese could do so little for so sublime a cause.

Time went on, and his industry did not flag. So vigorous was he, till within two years of his death, that many years yet of life were freely foretold for him. But it was not to be. As has been said, illness and death came unexpectedly. The day before he died he insisted, somewhat to the surprise of his confessor, on receiving the Holy Viaticum. When the doctor left him that night he saw no reason for immediate fear. The bishop was right, however; he died next morning at 8.15.

And so came to a close a life of unselfish, untiring toil for souls, for God; the life of one who might have taken as his motto: *Respiciite, quoniam non mihi soli laboravi.*

The deceased bishop was buried on 22nd January, at his own request in a humble grave, amongst his own beloved people. Bishop Fraser—himself, little as his audience thought it, already ripe for the sickle of the Reaper, Death—spoke a few words of sympathy with the deceased prelate's bereaved flock. The bishop's last instructions forbade him to do more. To the accompaniment of the heart-piercing wails of the *Benedictus*, impressively sung alternately by the assembled priests and St Joseph's College choir, the remains were laid to rest close to the little mortuary chapel in which the holy bishop had so often prayed for the souls of the flock which loved him so well.

This sketch has given Bishop Turner in his public life. The more intimate phases of his character may be seen in the following extracts from an appreciation by one of his own priests:—

"He was a true priest. He was all for God. He had many interests; every phase of life appealed to him; he might have used of himself the words of the poet, 'homo sum; humani nihil a me alienum puto,'—I am a man, nothing human is without interest to me; but everything was viewed in its bearing upon his spiritual work. Literature, philosophy, art, politics, not one of these had a value, or even an interest for him, except as affecting—whether as helping or hindering—the progress of our holy religion.

"He had no pretensions to being considered eloquent or learned. He had little taste or capacity—I do not know but he had a mild contempt—for the finer shades of language. Felicities of phrase, nuances of expression, were not, he said, in his line. 'I am no orator as Brutus is . . . I only speak right on'—this was pretty much his attitude. He said what he had to say with force, perhaps with an emphasis that was too indiscriminate; it was often clear that his words were much more vehement than his

thoughts. But he made his meaning clear, he brought his ideas home to his hearers or readers, and for the rest he was content to leave 'the persuasive words of human wisdom' to other people.

"I have said he had no pretensions to being learned. This is true. But it is equally true that he had a sound and in some respects a wide and deep knowledge of the branches of learning which are the special mental equipment of a priest—philosophy, theology, Church history, Canon Law, and his knowledge was all of a practical kind. He had little patience with academic learning; if a fact or theory had no bearing on his spiritual work or his business he dismissed it, so to speak, as irrelevant. He was essentially a practical mind; he had no time or taste for the purely speculative.

"Need I say that he was a holy bishop. He loved God, 'not in word or in tongue only, but in deed and in truth.' He was imbued with the spirit of prayer. It was but in keeping with his thoroughly priestly character that he had an intense love—a love which he was sometimes thought to carry even too far—for the ritual and liturgy of the Church. He could not have too much of either. The Divine Office he deeply revered. He never would recite it if he could at all help it, except where he could do so with devotion, and he always recited it with an intention and a deliberateness that were unusual. Any, the slightest sketch of his character, would be incomplete which did not bring out his love of Holy Scripture. He was often called upon to preach without the opportunity of due preparation, and he used to say that on such occasions he cast lavishly about him the seed of the Word of God. He was confident that the efficacy of the Word of God would compensate for the imperfection of his speech."—[*Communicated.*]

Pray for the repose of the soul of the Right Rev. ROBERT FRASER, LL.D., Bishop of Dunkeld, who died at Dundee on the 28th March 1914, in the 56th year of his age, the 32nd of his priesthood, and the 1st of his episcopate.

It is with peculiar regret we chronicle the death of this able and active prelate, who passed away so prematurely on the 28th March last. It is safe to say that not only did the news of his death come as a terrible shock to his own clergy and people of Dunkeld, but the event was felt as a calamity by the Church at large throughout the country. He had barely completed ten months in the episcopate, and during that short space all had recognised the advent of a new power within the diocese; he was in the full tide of his activity and success; seemingly he was enjoying his usual vigorous health; not even his intimate friends suspected anything seriously wrong; and all were looking forward to at least some years of such active and happy progress

and the fulfillment of many plans and projects of great promise, when suddenly came the news of his unexpected death.

Bishop Fraser was born in the parish of Kennethmont, Aberdeenshire, on the 10th August 1858. He lost his father at an early age, and, his friends designing him for the commercial life, his education at Aberdeen was shaped accordingly, and he had a special training under Dr Rennet, a famous teacher of mathematics, a branch of study for which the future bishop had great natural aptitude and in which he attained in after life great proficiency. His own thoughts, however, were turned towards the priesthood, and he proceeded to Blairs College in 1872. He completed his classical studies at St Edmund's, Douai, which he entered in 1875. His course was really a brilliant one, and the many college distinctions that came his way were due as much to hard work and application as to his great intellectual gifts. Even at that early stage he gave indication of that untiring industry and capacity for work which was his most prominent characteristic later on. In 1877 he was sent to the Scots College, Rome. Here again he was the model student, and after a remarkably successful course of philosophy and theology, during which he carried off several medals in both—he crowned his student's career by taking the degree of Doctor in Sacred Theology. He was raised to the priesthood on the 13th August 1882.

Returning to Scotland in 1883, he was appointed professor at Blairs, a post for which his classical acquirements naturally recommended him. As was to be expected, his years at Blairs were noted for their assiduity, regularity, systematic work, unflinching attention to duty. Those who knew him only in later life, and saw the geniality that his presence invariably diffused in any company, will be surprised to learn that it was the reverse in his young days. Indeed, to few men could the poet's words be more aptly addressed:—

Lenior et melior fis, accedente senecta.

He was a hard worker himself, and he looked for hard work in others. His system of teaching made small allowance, if not for the dulness, at least for the weakness of student human nature, and "penances" formed a regular part of his régime. That, however, gradually ceased. Time and experience showed a better way, and the success of his work did not suffer in consequence. And even with all his severity he enjoyed in a high degree and retained in after life the loyal affection of all students who came under his care.

The priest was not lost in the professor, and with all his attention to his main work, he was always on the look-out for opportunities of exercising his priestly functions. For many years he acted as "parish priest" at the College; *i.e.*, on him primarily rested the

duty of looking after the spiritual interests of the congregation, attending to the sick, and visiting the outlying portions of a wide district. It was a duty that was perfectly congenial to the man, and was done with his wonted thoroughness. He took quite a delight in the long journeys thus entailed, either on foot or on cycle, catechising children that had few opportunities of learning their faith, and rescuing Catholics that were in danger of lapsing owing to the few facilities they had in practising their religion. Here too, appeared a trait that was so marked in his short episcopate—the endeavour to bring the consolations of Holy Mass wherever scattered groups of Catholics could be found. Thus at Peterculter he was in the way of saying Mass periodically, for the benefit of some who could not travel the four miles to Blairs. The same zeal for conserving and propagating the Faith found an outlet in other ways, notably in newspaper correspondence, and his pen was ever ready to repel attacks in the public press on the truths of the Faith, and claims of the Church, or to clear up points in Scottish ecclesiastical history, of which he was always a close student.

During his stay at Blairs he enjoyed in a high degree the esteem of the bishops, and often work of a very confidential character was placed in his hands. In particular it may be mentioned that, when in the last decade of the 19th century the French government showed signs of preparing to appropriate our college property and revenues in that country, at the request of the bishops Dr Fraser drew up a memorandum on the history of the Scots Colleges in France, a document whose great value became apparent in later years.

When in 1897 the rectorship of the Scots College in Rome became vacant by the retirement of the late Mgr. Campbell, it was universally recognised that Dr Fraser was *par excellence* the man to fill the post. In the May of that year he was called to Rome by the Cardinal of the Congregation of Propaganda, and installed in the office of rector. The task before him was a formidable one. The college has been passing through a long crisis which had left it severely crippled in finances and otherwise disorganised. But he set himself courageously to face the difficulty, and in no long time had the satisfaction of seeing it overcome. Many generous benefactors came forward, and with their help he not only wiped out past deficits, but increased the bursaries and put the college on a sounder and surer footing than ever before. In time too he was enabled to improve and add to the buildings at the county house, and in a variety of ways did much to ameliorate the condition of the students.

While at Rome he acted as agent and representative of the Scottish bishops with the Holy See, an office which he discharged with his customary efficiency. Indeed he at all times enjoyed the highest confidence of the bishops of the country, who entrusted him with matters, often of great moment and responsibility, to be

negotiated with the various congregations. He was likewise a *persona grata* at the Vatican, particularly during the reign of Pius X., who had unbounded admiration for his management of the college. On this account too his services were much sought after by the English-speaking visitors and residents in the Eternal City. Amid a multiplicity of such varied occupations he yet found time for labours of a literary kind, and in 1903 appeared from his pen a translation of Père Rose's *Studies on the Gospels*.

Outside recognitions of his name and repute were not wanting. In 1906 he represented His Holiness at the tercentenary celebrations of the Aberdeen University, and on that occasion the University conferred on him the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws. In 1911 he fulfilled a similar mission to the University of St Andrews.

So full a record of work on so many sides made him a marked man, and he was freely spoken of for years past as one likely to occupy the episcopal office. When the death of Bishop MacFarlane in September 1912 left the See of Dunkeld vacant, many eyes turned to the Scots College, Rome, for a successor. And these expectations proved true. He was nominated Bishop of Dunkeld by Bull of 14th May 1913, and consecrated in Rome by Cardinal Merry del Val on the 25th of the same month. Coming to Scotland, he was solemnly enthroned in the Pro-Cathedral, Dundee, on the 24th June, amid a scene of great enthusiasm. In an address delivered on that occasion he spoke hopefully and encouragingly on the work and life that lay before him, and in particular emphasised the duty not only of preserving the faith of Catholics, but also of doing our utmost to bring its claims to the knowledge of our countrymen.

Without delay he set himself to compass the work he had mapped out, and the diocese was not long in realising what a tremendous power had come within its bounds. It is difficult, and perhaps unnecessary, to convey in a short space a full impression of the work he was enabled to accomplish, but a slight record may suffice. Within a few months he succeeded in opening two new missions, and preparing the way in two others. He was indefatigable in traversing his extensive diocese from end to end, making observations, suggesting improvements here and there, mainly with a view of bringing Mass and the Real Presence within reach of Catholics living at a distance from the priest. He never, if he could help it, refused an invitation anywhere, whether to preach or to pontificate, and he took a particular delight in being present at the social gatherings of congregations, as giving him an opportunity of knowing his people more intimately. Like his predecessor he had an immense interest in the Poor Mission Fund, seeing in it a potent instrument for realising some of his projects in the diocese, and his appeal for the annual collection met with a response successful beyond all preceding years. After his long connection with Rome, he had naturally a paternal interest in

what is often a "no man's land"—the Italian community in our midst. He was the means of bringing an Italian Sister of Charity to Dundee for purposes of visitation among her compatriots, and he gathered the Italians of the city for regular monthly services in their own language.

Nor were his activities confined to his own flock. He was in great request all over the country for occasional sermons or pontifical functions—occasions which, burdened as he was with work at home, he never declined. He took his share also in the social and public life of Dundee, the citizens of which regarded him with the highest esteem and respect.

All the time he was busy with the internal work of governing the diocese. He reorganised some of its arrangements, and made many changes in the *personnel* of the clergy—all with a view of greater effectiveness in the work of the ministry. His first pastoral appeared at the opening of Lent, and in it he spoke of his favourite topic—the Faith, and dwelt gratefully on what had been accomplished, and hopefully of what was yet to do, in consolidating and extending its hold upon the country. So it was always; barely was one good work finished when he was starting another. The speaker at the Month's Mind thus describes the impression left on an observer by the late bishop:—

"The dominant note in his life and character, and the one, I think, that explains best the secret of all his success, was a certain restless, almost tireless energy, but it was an energy that received its driving force and control and direction from a strong and active overruling Christian faith. He was cultured on many sides and attracted by many and varied interests, and was an interesting and instructive companion on many topics; but you never really got to the centre of his mind till you came to deal with things bearing on the diocese or the Church or the work of the Faith. He was one that really 'lived by faith.' And even a casual acquaintance could not fail to note and admire the energy of his character. He was business-like to the finger tips. He loved work simply for its own sake. Consciously or not, his life was modelled on the saying of the Wise Man: 'He that observeth the wind shall not sow; and he that considereth the clouds shall never reap.' Whatever work had to be done was done straight off. He never waited on opportunity. And he was ready to turn at any moment to any branch of his work—theology, canon law, rubrics, finance, administration, schools—he could at once turn to each with equal zest and interest.

"To be sure, he had the defects of such a quality—a certain impulsiveness of mind, impatience of delay, so intent on getting the main thing done as to be careless of details; in speech and writing he was habitually unobservant of the minor graces of style; he had sometimes a brusqueness of manner that offended when offence was furthest from his mind. But perhaps these very defects only ministered to his greatness. He was intensely

practical in everything. His mind centred on the definite main object before him, and whether it was acting or speaking or writing, he got there as straight and as directly as he could, and left side issues to look after themselves.

"His love of splendour in our liturgical services is well known, and wherever he appeared at functions he liked them to be carried out with all the fulness and solemnity of ceremonial our circumstances permitted. And yet he was the last to be associated with pride of place or rank, or with pretence of any kind. One of the charming things about him was his wholesome humility. When success after success was crowning his efforts, he was the last to look upon it as a personal matter, and he would put aside an attempt at compliment by a good-humoured 'God is good.' He was not above taking a suggestion, or even a correction, from minor men, and one of the sources of his success lay in his faculty of using other men to do work he was, either for want of time or disposition, less fitted to do himself.

"What a lovable personality he was! So uniformly cheerful, so buoyant in his optimism, so infectious in his enthusiasm, so kind and considerate, so ready to help, so tolerant of the shortcomings of frailer mortals that did not reach his own high standard of efficiency, so unselfish, so hospitable and accessible to all his priests."

Such was the man who was carried away so suddenly in the fulness of his powers. On Tuesday, 24th March, he was due at Stanley to choose ground for a new church and presbytery. He was making preparations in the morning when he was taken suddenly ill. The doctor was called; recognising the seriousness of the malady, ordered absolute and complete rest for days to come. An internal sore made an operation necessary, and this was successfully performed three days later. But the patient's strength did not survive the ordeal, and after receiving the last Sacraments he passed peacefully away on the afternoon of Saturday, 28th March.

The remains were conveyed to the Pro-Cathedral on the following Tuesday, and there in the evening the clergy recited the Office of the Dead. The funeral took place next day. Mgr. Holder was the celebrant of the Mass, at which several of the bishops and a large gathering of the clergy from all parts of the country. The church was crowded in every part by a large assembly of mourners, conspicuous amongst whom were representatives of the civic body of Dundee. The panegyric was spoken by Bishop Chisholm of Aberdeen, who paid a charming tribute to an old friend and colleague. After the fivefold absolution was given, the cortege proceeded to Balgay Cemetery, amid touching scenes of public mourning along the way. The remains of Bishop Fraser were then laid beside those of his predecessor, Bishop MacFarlane.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. WILLIAM CARMICHAEL, who died at Saltcoats on the 24th January 1914, in the 73rd year of his age, and the 47th of his priesthood.

The following extracts from the panegyric, pronounced at the funeral by Canon George W. Ritchie, provide a sketch of the career and character of Father Carmichael:—

“He was born at Tomintoul, Banffshire, of good Catholic parents on the 9th May 1841. He entered Blairs College on the 28th July 1855, and in September 1858 went to the Scots College, Rome. At the end of nine years' brilliant study in Rome he was ordained priest by Cardinal Patrizi, in St John Lateran's, on the 20th April 1867. There was yet the Temporal Power, and Rome was Papal. He rejoiced in after years to recall his days in the Eternal City, the lecture halls in the Gregorian University, the evening walks on the Pincio before the 'Ave Maria.'

“Returning to Scotland in the summer of 1867, after a few weeks at St Mary's, Greenock, he was attached to St Andrew's, Glasgow. In 1874 he was placed in charge of Dumbarton, and four years later of Cambuslang. The year 1885 saw him back again at the Cathedral Glasgow, as first assistant and right-hand man to the late Dr Munro, and there he continued till the latter's death in 1892. For the next five years he was at Port-Glasgow. Then in 1897 came his appointment to Chapelhall, which he relinquished in 1907 to take the charge of Saltcoats.

“From the moment of his ordination all through his long ministry of 47 years he had the highest ideal of the sacred priesthood, of what he should be himself and what he should be to others. His own sanctification came first. There are certain practices he observed all through his life. He rose early, and before the town or village was astir he was to be found all alone in the church communing with God. The morning meditation and preparation for Holy Mass were as necessary for him as the air he breathed. He never went out on his calls or came in without paying a visit to the altar. In the church, in the house, on the road, his rosary was always in his hands. The Divine Office was to him a delightful occupation. Each day he prepared for the recitation either by reading the life of the day's saint in Alban Butler's collection or by reading the paraphrase of some psalm. Thus day succeeded day. His piety was solid and unfeigned, his faith most deep and lively. His austerity to himself was most severe, and corporal discipline, even to the shedding of blood, was part of it. He lived in a circumscribed world of his own. Our Lord, Our Lady, St Joseph, St Andrew, St Teresa, St Philomena, St Winifred, were in it. They were the heaven of his world, with which he was daily and hourly communicating. In another plane of his world were Our Holy Father the Pope, the Archbishop, the Bishops of the Church, his fellow-priests and his beloved parishioners. When a

fellow-priest would call upon him he received him with beaming countenance, and unlike many others he showed no concern regarding the news of the daily paper. His topic of enquiry was, 'How is our Holy Father the Pope?' 'What are the triumphs of Holy Faith?' He was first and foremost a Catholic. He was a student. He believed in the maxim: 'nulla dies sine linea.' He would learn something every day. Books that he read and re-read were the Holy Bible, the History of the Church, the work of the Fathers, St Augustine, Bellarmine, Bona, Franzelin, and the Lives of the Saints. With him as with all priests on the mission, there was the daily round and routine of duty—the visitation of the sick and the dying, the schools, the calling upon the wandering and wayward. His care, attention, and patience in preparing souls for the other world were proverbial amongst the people. There was a winning charm in his manner which gained all to God.

"A holiday was seldom taken by him, for two reasons. He did not want to be away a day from his flock, and he had no money to spend on himself. Everything he had found its way to God's poor. They will miss him. So also will the children miss him. To them he was indeed a father, cheering and brightening their little lives with his happy words and enquiries. In the religious instruction of children it may be said he was born to the work. Few priests possess the gift he had in imparting a knowledge of the Faith to the little ones.

"Order and punctuality ruled his day. Two of his mottoes were—'Let all things be done in order'; and 'I have loved, O Lord, the beauty of Thy House.' His love and care for the altar were the admiration of his flock, whom he led to kneel and receive at the holy table by his word and example and the spotlessness of everything pertaining to it. To many he seemed to be of a stern and severe disposition, but those who knew him best are aware that never beat in man a kindlier, gentler heart. When the ruddy countenance in repose relaxed, the beaming eye and genial smile betokened the emotions of the tender heart.

"He had prepared many to die, and had seen many deaths. Now the pastor himself must die. A serious trouble affecting the blood system manifested itself on New Year's Day, causing him excruciating agony. The medical authority considering the gravity of the malady, informed him of the alternative: either he must die of blood-poisoning within a few days, or the diseased limb must be amputated. The soldier of Christ was prepared for either event, devoutly receiving all the Sacraments and taking unto himself 'the armour of God.' A few days passed and there was some improvement in his condition, but there was no hope of life, humanly speaking, without a surgical operation. Being always a man and a priest subject to authority, he had the matter referred to the decision of his ecclesiastical superiors, who consented to the surgical operation being performed. The operation was successful,

but the age of the venerable patient, three score and thirteen, was against him. For twelve days he lingered on, suffering intense pain and crushing spasms of the heart with heroic patience. The end came on Saturday, 24th January."

There was a Requiem Service at Saltcoats on the following Monday. The remains were then conveyed to St Andrew's Cathedral, Glasgow, where on Tuesday 27th January, the funeral took place. The celebrant was the Very Rev. Canon M'Carthy, with Fathers M'Coll and Bernard Lynch as deacon and subdeacon. The Coadjutor Archbishop was in attendance. The interment took place in Dalbeth Cemetery.

Pray for the soul of the Rev. PETER HENRY TERKEN, of Baillieston, who died at Sheffield on the 15th March 1914, in the 67th year of his age, and the 39th of his priesthood.

"Father Terken was born at Mierlo, N. Brabant, Holland, on the 1st August 1847. At a very early age, he showed signs of a vocation for the priesthood, and his good Catholic parents fostered the rising inclination. When the time had come for making a final decision, like many of his countrymen then as now, he chose the mission field. The Church in England and Scotland had then only recently entered into its second spring, and all over the Continent among the Catholic people fervent prayers were offered up to God for the conversion of these countries. This fired the enthusiasm of the young student, and he offered his services to the late Archbishop Eyre. Sir John Sutton, an English convert, had just established at Bruges a seminary for the education of young men, English, Scotch, or foreign, who had a desire to labour on the mission in these countries. Mr Terken, having studied philosophy at Roulers, in Belgium, betook himself to the new college and there commenced the study of theology. He had almost reached the last year of his studies, when Archbishop Eyre called him to Glasgow, where an ecclesiastical seminary was being opened. Mr Terken brought to it the fervour and discipline which he had learned in the ancient and venerable institutions of the Continent. He entered St Peter's College, Partickhill, in 1874, and he left it an ordained priest on 17th January 1876. He was the first fruit of that newly planted tree in the garden of the Church, and his after life has shown how worthy the first fruit has been. After his ordination, Father Terken was sent to Maryhill as assistant to the late Canon Cameron. Owing to the fact that Canon Cameron was then in very indifferent health, and acted as Vicar-General of the Archbishop, the newly-appointed young priest had a heavy charge. However, he discharged his onerous duties with so much acceptance and ability, that at the end

of three years he was appointed to the pastorate of Baillieston, where he spent the remainder of his life. In Baillieston, he had to overcome great and serious difficulties; the mission had only recently been made into a separate charge, and a great deal had to be undertaken. The older members of the congregation well remember how courageously he began the work and how successfully he accomplished it. The care of himself and his own comforts was his last thought; he secured in the first place a dwelling-place more or less worthy of the Divine Presence; he catered for the comfort and well-being of the school-children, and all the while he himself lived in a house inferior to that of the poorest of his parishioners: a dilapidated miner's cottage, where his sleeping apartment was a wooden shed added to the rest of the building.

“Father Terken practically spent his whole priestly life in Baillieston, and one has only to look round to see the material monuments of his zeal; the magnificent church, the well-equipped schools, the presbytery, the recreation-hall, all bear testimony. But he has left more than mere monuments in stone, his noblest memorial is the deep reverence and love which live in the hearts of his parishioners. They knew him best; for Father Terken, Baillieston was the world, he knew no other. Except by his friends among the clergy he was little known outside his parish, and yet he was one of our most venerable and deserving priests. It was given to him to spend practically his whole life among the people of Baillieston, and yet, strange to say, he died away from his parish and from his own flock. But he died surrounded by the loving care of his nephew, a priest also, and one towards whom he had always acted like a father, and to whose house he had gone for change and rest. One of his last wishes was that his body might be brought to Baillieston and his mortal remains buried next to those of his brother priests on the banks of the Clyde, and not far from his people whom he had always loved so much.

“Father Terken's dying wish was scrupulously carried out; the mortal remains were brought to Baillieston and buried on Wednesday, 18th March. The Coadjutor Archbishop presided at the Requiem Mass: Father Theodore Terkin, nephew of the deceased, sang the Mass and officiated at the grave; the funeral oration was preached by Canon De Backer, an old college companion and life-long friend of the deceased. An immense concourse of priests and people followed the remains to the graveyard at Dalbeth, and the memory of the imposing cortege will long remain in Baillieston and its neighbourhood to tell of Father Terken and how deeply his people loved him. May he rest in the peace of Christ.”—[From *St Peter's College Magazine*.]

Pray for the soul of THOMAS BROPHY, of the Diocese of Dunkeld, who died at Windgap, Co. Kilkenny, on the 16th August 1914, in the 56th year of his age, and the 30th of his priesthood.

Father Brophy was a native of Co. Kilkenny, Ireland, and received his early education at the Carmelite College, Knocktopher, in the same county. Entering St John's College, Waterford, for the higher studies, in 1879, he there received all his orders, being raised to the priesthood on the 15th June 1884. Immediately on ordination, he placed his services at the disposal of the Diocese of Dunkeld, where he had several intimate friends amongst the clergy, and coming to this country was stationed as assistant at St Mary's, Dundee. At this post he remained for the long space of fifteen years, and during that time, by his close fidelity to duty and his kindly and genial ways, merited, and in after years retained, the affection and respect of his people. In 1899 he was transferred to St Mary's, Lochec, where he continued till 1902. In that year, after spending a few months at St John's, Perth, he was placed in charge of Ballechin. Three years later came his appointment to Crieff. Never of a very robust constitution, he was, particularly in later years, visited with many sharp sicknesses, and in the summer of 1910, owing to failing health, he felt himself compelled to demit his charge, and to relinquish the active work of the ministry. Since then he had been living in retirement at Windgap, Co. Kilkenny, where he passed away on the 16th August 1914.

Pray for the soul of WILLIAM DAWSON, formerly of the Diocese of Aberdeen, who died at Teignmouth on the 17th August 1914, in the 61st year of his age, and the 38th of his priesthood.

The Rev. William Dawson was born at Huntly on the 19th September 1853. He entered Blairs College on the 16th July 1866, and was transferred to the Scots College, Valladolid, in November 1870. Here he was ordained priest on the 23rd September 1876. Returning to Scotland immediately thereafter, he was sent to assist at Braemar, where he continued for the next three years. Failing health necessitated a change of place, and he spent one year in charge of the mission of Dalmellington, in Ayrshire. But his constitution was of too frail a kind to stand our northern climate, and in 1880 he removed to the South of England, where he was able to take up light chaplaincy work. Some years later his services were permanently transferred to the Diocese of Plymouth, and at the time of his death he had been for many years in charge of Teignmouth.

THE main object of this College is to educate and train for the Priesthood those who may feel themselves called to dedicate themselves to God and the salvation of souls as Clergymen on the Scottish Mission. To this object all its funds are applied.

The requisite outfit comprises, two suits of tweed of the pattern known as parson grey (small boys may come in knickerbockers), two pairs of strong shoes, one pair slippers, the usual underclothing for day and night use, flannels, stockings and towels, a warm overcoat for winter. The Course of Education comprises all that is usually taught in Colleges.

Students will not be admitted before their twelfth year. They must bring with them a certificate showing that they have satisfactorily stood an examination in religious and secular knowledge equivalent to that required in the Highest Grade of an Elementary School. The time of entry is early in August—the exact date being fixed in June—and all students must be in the College on the day appointed. The greatest care is taken of their health; strict attention is paid to their comfort, and they are attended by a Medical Gentleman as often as occasion may require.

ST MUNGO'S ACADEMY

TOWNHEAD, GLASGOW

Conducted by the MARIST BROTHERS

THIS Academy was founded in 1858 with a view to provide for the better-class Catholic children of Glasgow and environs a training both thoroughly religious and thoroughly practical.

In 1897, 1902, and 1905, the Premises were considerably enlarged in order to procure comfortable accommodation for the increased number of pupils. At present, besides the ordinary classrooms, the School has well-equipped Scientific Laboratories, an Art Room, a Library, and a Hall for Modelling in Clay and Free Drawing. Attached to the School are open and covered Granolithic Play-grounds, provided with Gymnastic Appliances for the physical development of the Pupils.

The School comprises three separate *Departments*, viz. : (1) The *Primary Department*; (2) The *Higher Grade Intermediate Department*; and (3) The *Higher Grade Advanced Department*, all of which are regularly examined by H.M. Inspectors.

The *Primary Department*, including Infants' Classes, professes, together with the rudiments of French, the full course of the Primary Education Code (Scotland). The test of fitness to pass from this to the Higher Grade Intermediate Department is the Merit Certificate or the "Qualifying" Examination.

The *Higher Grade Intermediate Course* occupies three years, and includes Religion, English, French, Latin or German, Arithmetic, Mathematics, Geography, History, Experimental Science, Drawing, Vocal Music, and Physical Drill.

The *Intermediate Leaving Certificate* of the Scotch Education Department completes this Course, and entitles the holder to proceed to

The *Higher Grade Advanced Department*, where an additional course of study, more or less on specific lines, is pursued, (1) by "Junior Students" in training for the Teaching Profession, (2) by Intending University Students for other Professions, and (3) by Students preparing for the Civil Service, etc.

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Fees payable quarterly in advance, on the 1st August, 1st November, 1st February, and 1st May.
